"Big Tim," famous "Joiner," was still "Big Tim" after he had affiliated himself by government request, with the fraternity at Fort Leavenworth federal prison today, and had been "dressed in" as prisoner 18990.

Mr. Murphy, distinguished in well tailored clothes and fawn-colored fedora hat, gazed quizzically up at the prison yesterday.

"So this is the boarding house. Some dump," mused the labor czar as he strutted, imperious as a peacock up the stairs.

Prisoner 18990, simple and guileless in plain blue denim of classic lines and conventional cut, poked his long head out from behind a layer of iron bars and gazed down at the deputizing of United States marshals leaving this afternoon.

For a few moments "Big Tim" was a prison welfare worker, as he envisioned the day for each of the 2,387 men on the welcoming committee.

Omaha Man Urges Consolidation of Railroad Lines

Carl Gray of Union Pacific Says Linking System With Northwestern Would Prove Advantageous.

Washington, Feb. 26.—Prospects for consolidation of western and southern railroad lines, which have been tentatively prepared since the passage of the transportation act, were favorably discussed by officials of major carriers in that territory appearing before the Interstate Commerce commission.

Carl Gray of Omaha, president of the Union Pacific, said the linking up of that system with the present line of the Chicago & Northwestern would probably work out to advantage, inasmuch as the two carriers at present interchange a large volume of their traffic.

Lewis J. Spencer, director of traffic for the Southern Pacific, which, under the government consolidation plan, would be combined with the Rock Island, stressed the necessity which he said existed for keeping all the component parts of the first named railroad together in any consolidation.

D'Annunzio Given Honorary Position in Turkish Army. Rome, Feb. 27.—Gabriele D'Annunzio has accepted the post of honorary generalissimo of the Turkish army, according to the newspapers here.

D'Annunzio has sent an address to his new comrades in arms with his signature in Turkish characters. The Kemal leader brought him his insignia and equipment of his rank, which carries with it the title of pasha.

The post-soldier donned the red fez and told the Turks that he was ready to give up his honorary position and become an effective in the native service if needed.

Loss of Tapestry Found in Home of J. D. Rockefeller. Works of Art Woven in 1450 for Duke de la Rochefoucauld Hanging in Residence of Oil Magnate.

New York, Feb. 27.—Six tapestries woven about 1450 for the Duke de la Rochefoucauld, the whereabouts of which recently was made the subject of an official inquiry in Paris, are hanging in the home of John D. Rockefeller, jr., the New York Evening Post said it had learned yesterday.

According to the newspaper, the tapestries were shown in the Anderson galleries here last November and admission was by card only. On the third day the tapestries were suddenly withdrawn by an American collector for \$1,000,000.

Although something of a mystery was made of the matter at the time, no general interest was aroused until disappearance of the tapestries was noted in Paris and the Ben Solr and other publications addressed various questions to the minister of fine arts, with the usual protest against France losing its art treasures.

Controversy then developed over the question of whether Count Gabriel de la Rochefoucauld ever had promised not to permit the historic tapestries to leave France, and whether a sale would not violate French law.

Miles Bosworth, architect, admitted that the tapestries had been purchased by Mr. Rockefeller through himself as agent. He declared, however, that the tapestries were now in transit from London and had never been in the Rockefeller home.

Defendant Takes Stand in Texas Land Fraud Case. Kansas City, Mo., Feb. 27.—The defense rested Monday in the trial in federal court, of W. E. Stewart, president of the W. E. Stewart Land company, who is charged with use of the mails to defraud in connection with an alleged land swindle in Hidalgo county, Texas.

This action followed the testimony of Stewart, who took the stand in his own defense late in the day. Mr. Stewart testified that in three years, 1919, 1920 and 1921, his company had spent \$660,000 in rebuilding and repairing the Endenburg irrigation system, and that his instructions to M. E.
