

### N. Y. Contractor Slain in Auto; Woman Sought

#### 40 Sleuths Seeking Well-Dressed Blonde Woman Reported to Have Been in Car.

New York, Feb. 27.—A blonde woman, well dressed and carrying a dark bag, was being trailed today by a squad of 40 detectives, instructed to find the woman in the case, believed by the police to have slain Frederick Schneider, wealthy contractor, in a barren spot in the Bronx as dusk was gathering last night.

The police have an accurate description of the supposed slayer and a coat thought to belong to her.

Schneider, executor of some of the biggest construction jobs in the east, including the Roosevelt apartment, said to be the largest in the world and a \$1,000,000 viaduct, and a member of half a dozen clubs, was separated from his wife. He and Mrs. Schneider were not friendly, their acquaintances said.

He left his office in mid-afternoon, after luncheon with three of his stenographers, and fetching his pet Chow dogs, Hula and Zulu, drove to one of his projects to consult with his nephew, William Schneider, and engaged to meet him at the downtown office at 5:30 p. m. He drove back to his Broadway office and near there, he met the blonde woman, who was awaiting him.

This woman, seen by two shopkeepers was believed by the police to have accompanied Schneider in his automobile.

Nicholas Fugler, a truck farmer, who saw the car shortly after the shooting, said he was nearing home when he saw the automobile coming towards him. He heard two muffled reports, saw the car lurch forward and then stop.

One story is that Fugler saw the woman emerge from the curtained tonneau, look back and then vanish in the twilight; another is that he simply saw a woman a few moments later walking away.

Upon looking into the tonneau when the woman disappeared, Fugler saw Schneider, fallen over the wheel, dead, one hand in his overcoat pocket, the other on the wheel, the foot clutch disengaged. He called the police. Schneider was shot twice, obviously from a .38 caliber pistol lying beside

him. He could not have killed himself and been in the same position as when he was shot, police said. One wound was in the neck and another behind an ear.

Mrs. Anna Bruzzi, known also as Anna Schneider, housekeeper for Schneider, was arrested today as a material witness. She denied all knowledge of the crime after detectives had questioned her for six hours and became hysterical when lodged in a cell.

### Violence in Chicago Voting

#### Kidnaping of Officials, Shooting and Ballot Box Stuffing Alleged.

Chicago, Feb. 27.—Charges of kidnaping of officials, stuffing ballot boxes and of the use of firearms and gang politics today marked the primaries in which for the first time in mayoral primaries and elections for the last eight years, Mayor William Hale Thompson's name is not on the ballot and in which for the first time also in Chicago aldermanic candidacies appear on a nonpartisan ticket. In the old Twenty-first ward, including the "gold coast" on the Lake Michigan shore, just north of the downtown business district, now the new Forty-second ward, Michael A. Lannina, a democratic judge, was missing and was reported to have been kidnaped by a band of five men who invaded the polling place. Investigators could find no one to admit the man had been carried away forcibly. The precinct is in an Italian neighborhood.

Alderman Dorsey Crowe and Charles Agnew are contesting in the ward to determine which shall represent it. Before the redistricting each of the 35 wards which were represented by two aldermen, now will have but one.

There were unverified reports of the firing of shots in the Fourteenth ward, of stuffing ballots in a ballot box in an Eighteenth ward precinct before the polls were opened and of gang methods in a Seventeenth ward precinct. A heavy republican vote was being cast, it was estimated, while democratic and socialist candidates were chiefly without opposition.

### Insurance Policies to Be Sold in Favor of Creighton

Something new in campaign soliciting has been evolved by Ward M. Burgess for the Creighton university building and endowment campaign, which will open next week. Mr. Burgess is chairman of the executive committee of the campaign.

Business Omaha is to be asked to insure itself for the benefit of Creighton. Next Monday morning 400 trained life insurance solicitors will "invade" business Omaha and will ask that insurance policies be taken out in favor of Creighton.

This is the only form of soliciting which will be carried on in the business district of the city during the Creighton campaign. A solicitation campaign will be waged in the residential districts, but not downtown.

### Lewis Burgess Promoted to New Position in Store

Lewis Burgess, son of Ward Burgess, has been promoted to the position of assistant merchandise manager of the Burgess-Nash Co. store, J. F. Dalley, general manager, announced yesterday. He will act as the personal representative of Mr. Dalley in supervising sales promotion along intensive lines.

Mr. Burgess, among many other duties, will check the advertising proofs each day to determine that merchandise and values are just as represented, and will have general co-operative duties with department managers.

J. J. Hasley has resigned and will leave Omaha about April 1, to take a similar position with L. S. Ayers & Co., Indianapolis, Ind.

### Dr. Von Schulte to Attend Convention at Ann Arbor

Dr. H. Von W. Schulte, dean of Creighton Medical college, will leave Thursday night for Ann Arbor, Mich., to attend the meeting of the deans of the Association of Medical Colleges, which will be held in that city March 2 and 3. New rules deemed expedient will be adopted at this meeting. Deans of several colleges attending the Ann Arbor meeting will be guests of the American Medical association at its meeting in Chicago next Monday and Tuesday.

### Animal Ambulance Called.

New animal ambulance service of the Humane society was called into action late yesterday afternoon when a \$200 German podice dog belonging to Lee Larson was run over by an automobile at Thirty-third and Harney streets. The dog was taken to an animal hospital, but its injuries were so serious that it was killed.

### Has Drugs; Is Arrested.

John Douglas, 1310 Jones street, was arrested yesterday afternoon when detectives found a quantity of drugs on his person. He probably will be turned over to federal authorities.

### New Find Older Than Man-Ape

#### Dr. E. H. Barbour Declares That Light Will Be Thrown on Unknown Period.

It is entirely probable that the fossilized human skull discovered in Patagonia by Dr. J. G. Wolf, which is believed to be of the tertiary period, is 500,000 years older than the skull of the erect man-ape, pitheanthropus erectus, which was found in Java 29 years ago, in the opinion of Dr. E. H. Barbour, noted anthropologist of the University of Nebraska.

Dr. Barbour was told of the discovery by The Omaha Bee yesterday. He emphasized the importance of it, declaring that if proved authentic the discovery will throw light on the history of man in a period hitherto unknown.

"After all 500,000 years is a short state of time," said Dr. Barbour. "The discovery, which no doubt is authentic, is of the utmost importance, because it adds to the continuity of the chain of discoveries which eventually will make the history of man as complete as the history of any other animal."

"Yes, scientists have speculated on the possibility of man having existed in the tertiary period, and traces of the man-ape animal have been found in various rocks. In this connection the important discovery of two teeth on the Harold Cook ranch in Sioux county, western Nebraska, should be mentioned. These gave evidence of a western anthropoid of an extremely early period, probably early pleistocene. This discovery was made 4 years ago, and added much to the chest of information now possessed by science."

### A Queer World

#### Marriage License in Chicago Is \$1.50; Fee for Dog Costs \$3—It's All Wrong, Says Commissioner.

Chicago, Feb. 27.—A marriage license in Chicago today is \$1.50. The license fee for a dog costs \$3. The difference of a \$1.50 led Patrick J. Carr, county treasurer, to urge the county board yesterday to favor a \$5 license fee. Commissioner Thomas Murphy said:

Medford, Ore., Feb. 27.—Mayor Gaddis, with the council unanimously approving, has made a clean sweep of the local fire department to out of office March 1, because the members are too old. No formal charges were filed.

Chief J. W. Lawton, 67, has been a member of the department for the last 12 years and the past nine years as chief.

The other members are: D. T. Lawton, 79, brother of the chief; F. N. Parker, 53; James Rosentbury, 50, and Taylor Burch, 53. The mayor appointed Roy Elliott, 35, formerly of the department, as chief, to select his own men with approval of the council.

### Alaskan Reserve Set Aside for Oil

#### President Harding Plans for Naval Fuel—Larger Area Than All Other Tracts.

Washington, Feb. 27.—President Harding, by executive order, today set aside an area of more than 35,000 square miles in the northwest section of Alaska as an oil reserve to insure fuel for the navy. This naval reserve will exceed by 20,000,000 acres the combined area of the three other reserves, one in Oklahoma and two in California, which is less than 2,000,000 acres. The new reserve adjoins the corner of Alaska between Icy Cape and Cape Barrow and is bounded by the Arctic ocean on the north and west and the Endicott range of mountains and the Coboville river on the south and east. It is for the most part flat grassy tundra, devoid of vegetation, sparsely populated and entirely within the Arctic circle. The reservation, according to Secretary Fall of the Interior department, will be of the greatest importance to the navy since, for years, seapages of oil have been found along the seacoast. How much oil the reserve will produce, Secretary Fall said, is not yet known, as no government surveys have been made. The petroleum possibilities, however, have attracted private investigation and about 125,000 acres have been allotted to some 50 applicants for development. No drilling has been done.
