

### Traffic League Opposed to Plan of Car Pooling

System Would Create Another "Middle Man" and Increase Charges, Report States.

The proposed National Security Owners Car Pooling plan is merely the injection of another central body between the shippers and the carriers, according to the view taken by the committee on transportation and instrumentalities and car service of the National Industrial Traffic League at a recent meeting in Chicago, J. A. Kuhn, traffic manager of the Omaha Grain exchange, who attended the meeting, reports.

The committee consists of 10 members who are connected with manufacturing and shipping interests located in various parts of the United States, who were instructed to prepare a report on the plan to be considered by the league as a whole at its next annual meeting in Dallas, Tex., April 18 and 19.

**Increased Charges.**  
The pooling plan, which is known as the Warfield plan, is for a national organization to take over the building of new cars and rebuilding old cars, making the organization a central distributing agency for all carriers of the United States," Mr. Kuhn said.

The American Railway association takes the position that machinery, better than under the plan proposed, is now available to meet any emergency which may arise in regard to car service; that the adoption would increase rather than decrease operating expenses, with a resultant increase in charges against the public; that the railroad transportation ma-

chine already is so hampered by restrictive governmental regulation that a further limiting of the power of individual initiative and enterprise such as involved in the proposed pooling plan is inimical to the highest usefulness and efficiency of the railroad management.

**Await Reply.**  
The committee seemed inclined to the view that the pooling plan simply means the injection of another central body between the shippers and the carriers, thus eliminating practically the only instrument of competition left to the individual railroad.

"It was, however, decided to await the reply of the National Association of the Owners of Railway Securities to the opposition presented by the American Railway association, and the committee will meet again in the near future before making its recommendations to the league as a whole.

**Representatives of the Warfield plan, as well as representatives of the American Railway association, were present during the two-day session of the committee and every phase of the situation was discussed.**

**Rules Too Rigid.**  
"It was admitted by the railway representatives that some of the car service rules as at present interpreted were too rigid and that they would be revised so as to make them more elastic."

**Shortage of power rather than**

shortage of cars was given as the reason for the recent car shortage.

"It was also pointed out by the carriers that more orders for new engines and new cars have been placed than ever before in the history of the American railways and that by August of this year the equipment of the railroads in general will be in the best condition of the last 20 years."

**Sheeran Takes Position at Burgess-Nash Store**

J. J. Sheeran has come from Chicago to be merchandising manager of the Burgess-Nash store. He had been associated with J. F. Dalley, when the latter was manager of the Chicago store. Mr. Sheeran possesses the croix de guerre and other decorations won in the world war at Verdun and was twice wounded. He says he does not intend to change present store methods of merchandising.

**Pint and a Half Taken in Raid on Howard Hotel**

The Howard hotel, Tenth and Howard streets, was raided yesterday by federal prohibition agents and John Martig, proprietor, and Albert Mix, bartender, were arrested. A pint and a half of liquor was confiscated. Group chief Anderson said five purchases of liquor have been made at the hotel by federal agents.

### Rector Pleads Guilty to Charge of Manslaughter

Slayer of Charles Foley Says He Meant to "Right a Wrong"—Sentence Is Deferred.

Russel Rector, 35, teamster, who has been held in county jail on a charge of first degree murder in connection with the fatal shooting of Charles Foley at his home, 1808 Grace street, the night of March 4, threw himself on the mercy of District Judge Goss yesterday afternoon.

He pleaded guilty to manslaughter. "I went there that night to right a wrong," he told the judge. "I wanted to effect a reconciliation with my wife if I could. We had been separated seven months. I didn't know she was going to get a divorce."

He told the judge he asked Foley for his wife, and they got into an argument. He said Foley struck at him, after which he pulled a gun and shot at Foley three times. "I will have to investigate your

case before I can pronounce sentence," Judge Goss told him.

"I understand the state has more evidence than you have. You have only your testimony, and the state has made a full investigation. Before I pass sentence, I want to be sure that I am doing justice both to you and to society."

Sentence probably will be pronounced today or Monday. Earlier in the day, Rector sent for County Attorney Beal and told him he was ready to plead guilty to manslaughter.

"I killed a man," he said, "and I want to get my sentence and get it over with, so I can get out and bring up my children to be good citizens."

His arraignment before Judge Goss followed.

### Banker Now in Pen to Be Tried for Fraud

Willard V. Mathews, former president of the Pioneer State bank, now serving a sentence of one to 10 years in the penitentiary, will be tried with 24 others on charges of conspiracy to use the mails to defraud.

Federal Judge Woodruff, on application of United States Attorney Kinsler, signed an order of habeas corpus yesterday commanding Warden Fenton to have Mathews in federal court next Tuesday at 9.


