

Bank Replies to Injunction on Sale of Notes

Charge "Gross Injustice" in Action of Holdrege Judge — Want the Loan Paid.

Lincoln, March 17.—(Special).—In an answer filed in the supreme court Saturday, the temporary injunction restraining the State Bank of Omaha and John S. McGurk, its vice president, from selling notes and other securities belonging to the Citizens State Bank of Holdrege, is termed a "gross injustice."

The Omaha bank says the sale was widely advertised and that neither the banking department nor the stockholders of the Holdrege Citizens bank objected to it, and that it was intended to sell only enough of the notes to settle the loan.

It is set forth that several bankers had arranged to attend the public auction and the securities would have brought top price.

The brief says that if the draft of \$178,000 on the guaranty fund ordered by Judge Dilworth at Holdrege had been paid, it would not have been necessary to sell any of the securities.

The state bank of Omaha is willing to give up the securities any time the original loan is paid, according to the brief.

Falls City Store Cutted by Fire

J. C. Penney Company Estimates Loss at \$78,000—Started in Basement.

Falls City, Neb., March 17.—(Special).—Fire in the basement of J. C. Penney company store here caused an estimated loss of \$78,000 to the stock and \$18,000 to the building. The blaze started in a rubbish pile in the basement of the store and 15 minutes later the flames were licking their way through the roof of the two-story building with four-fifths of the \$75,000 stock an entire loss. Fire walls constructed two years ago are believed to have saved the adjoining buildings. The store had been gaily decorated in honor of St. Patrick day with a newly arrived pre-Easter stock of spring wearing apparel on display. This is the third time the building was gutted in three years.

Bryan Backs Up on Challenge for Code Debate

Governor Refuses to Discuss Issues in Omaha With Representative R. R. Strehlow.

Lincoln, March 17.—(Special).—Governor C. W. Bryan apparently has no desire to debate Representative R. R. Strehlow of Omaha on the issue of the repeal of the code, although the governor recently suggested a series of debates with members in their own home communities.

Replying to the letter which Representative Strehlow sent to Mr. Bryan suggesting a debate in Omaha, the governor said:

"I have Mr. Strehlow's communication, but he evidently has the erroneous impression that I issued a general challenge to members of the legislature to debate the various plans of code repeal and revision now before the legislature."

"What I said was, that if any member did not feel that the people had expressed their desire for repeal of the code law by the 59,000 majority which they gave my candidacy for governor last November, I would go to the county seats of their respective districts and jointly discuss my plan before their constituents and let the latter judge as to whether or not it was in accordance with the will of the majority."

"I do not intend to be diverted from this to anything else." The governor said that he had not received an official notice of a challenge to debate from Senator Perry Reed.

Turk Proposals Prove Kemalists' Desire for Peace

Reply to Draft of Treaty Summarized by Angora Representative at Paris—Several Parts Acceptable.

Paris, March 17.—(Special).—The Turkish counter proposals to the Lausanne peace treaty draft are "replete with evidences of Turkey's pacifism, all the conditions conforming to the Angora government's desire for peace and independence," declared Hussein Raghib Bey, the Angora representative here.

Raghib Bey, who sat up throughout Friday night digesting the text of this lengthy document, which reached Paris by courier, forecast possible differences in the interpretation of the text, according to which negotiation was doing the translation. His digest divides the Angora project into two parts, the first being given over to these parts of the Lausanne treaty which are acceptable to the Turks and the second to the sections which their propositions have modified.

Proposals Accepted.

In the first part is included Turkey's acceptance of a delay in the solution of the dispute over the Mosul fields between Turkey and Great Britain for one year, and its reference to the league of nations for settlement if no agreement was then reached; the granting of Karaghatch, the Adrianople suburb, to the Greeks, the draft treaty solution for the freedom of the straits and the treaty's adjustment of the minorities problem.

Turkey likewise accepts the appointment of three neutral judges of Turkish courts for five years and agrees to reorganize the department of justice, these stipulations being in line with the allied plan for solution of the question of the status of foreigners in the Turkish courts.

Want Frontier Changes.

In the second part of the digest the modifications include the request that the frontier line between Greece and Turkey run through the middle river Maritza instead of along the left bank; and for the possession by Turkey of the island of Castellorizza, part of the Dodecanese group, thus leaving Italy 11 of the islands. Turkey claims that Castellorizza practically belongs to the Anatolian coast.

The Turks further propose to distribute the "public debt" among the allied governments which, by the treaty, are confirmed in their possession of territory which belonged, up to the time of the armistice, to the Ottoman empire. It is argued that it is unjust to ask the Anatolian faction of that empire to sustain the burden of the entire prewar debt. This proposal includes the debts contracted in the name of the empire during the war.

Negro Race Makes Rapid Increase

Census Shows Males Exceed Females in State — Little Illiteracy.

Lincoln, March 17.—(Special).—The negro race showed the largest percentage of increase in Nebraska in the decade from 1910 to 1920, according to figures made public today by Acting Secretary Joseph W. Mayer of the department of agriculture.

The percentage of increase in native born whites is given as 12.5; of foreign born whites 14.9 and negro 22.5.

Mayer's report shows 288,250 dwellings in the state and 203,436 families, with a total population in Lincoln of 24,948 and 191,604 in Omaha. Lincoln has 26,554 males and 28,924 females. Omaha has 98,864 males and 92,464 females.

Between the ages of 5 and 20, 70.6 per cent of nationalities attend school, and between the ages of 7 to 13, 7 per cent of all nationalities are enrolled in the schools.

With a total population of 1,296,372 for the state, Mayer reports 405,306 are found in the cities and 891,066 in the rural communities. There are 672,805 males and 623,576 females. But 1.4 per cent of illiteracy is reported for the state.

Of the total population, 1,129,567 or 87.1 per cent is native born whites; 149,652 or 11 per cent foreign born whites; 2,884 or 2 per cent Indian, and all other races have less than 1 per cent.

Paving Program Opposed.

Beatrice, Neb., March 17.—That local taxpayers may oppose the city's 1923 paving program became apparent when property owners in district 47 a paving subdivision, filed a remonstrance against the proposed improvement. It has not been determined whether the remonstrance bears sufficient signatures to kill the project.

Parole Board Frees Man Held for Manslaughter

Indian, Accused of Forgery by Father, Is Released—Four Omahans Are Paroled.

Lincoln, March 17.—(Special).—The state pardon board today granted a parole to Herbert F. Whitmore, who was sentenced for from one to 10 years on a manslaughter charge growing out of the death of a man named Lundy, his landlord at Bayard, Neb. County officials of Morrill county and prominent people of New Castle, Wyo., where Whitmore was formerly a deputy sheriff, recommended the prisoner's release. According to the testimony at the parole hearing, Whitmore was convicted on circumstantial evidence. A woman housekeeper, who had been tried separately on the same charge, was acquitted. Whitmore is going back to New Castle, where he will become superintendent of the New Castle Oil company plant.

Garnett Goings, 17, Sioux Indian, serving a term for forgery, was freed by the board. Goings' father, Frank C. Goings, chief of police of the Pine Ridge reservation in South Dakota, brought the charge against his son. Goings has served three and a half years for forging a check for \$5 on his father.

Four Omaha prisoners, forger, one to 20; James Churchill, grand larceny, one to seven; Stanley G. Peters, grand larceny, one to seven; Harry Nelson, breaking and entering, one to three.

Paroles were denied the following Omaha prisoners: Arthur Beach, auto stealing, one to five; John Smith, grand larceny, one to seven; Walter F. Bell, robbery, three to 15.

Goodhue Unable to Prepare Answer to Charges in Week

Lincoln, March 17.—(Special).—Capitol Architect B. G. Goodhue has notified Governor Bryan and State Engineer Johnson that he was unable to prepare a reply to Johnson's last series of questions addressed to him within the week allowed him by the commission for that purpose. Goodhue says his office manager, F. L. Mayers, is seriously ill and he will need the latter's help in drafting the reply.

Special Election Asked in Beatrice on City Manager

Beatrice, Neb., March 17.—A petition was filed at the city hall here asking for a special election at which the voters will decide whether or not Beatrice is to abandon the present city commission and adopt the manager plan of municipal government.

Barrows Can Draw Pay.

Lincoln, March 17.—(Special).—Former Lieutenant Governor P. A. Barrows can now draw his pay as acting governor under the McKelvie administration. Governor Bryan has notified Secretary of State Paul E. Barrows' salary will for \$1,802 became a law Friday without the executive signature.
