

Fascisti Move in U.S. Backed by Mussolini

Agents from Italy Are Organizing Society in America as Part of World Body.

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(By International News Service.)
New York, March 19.—Under the personal supervision of Benito Mussolini, premier of Italy, who captured the Italian government by his organization of Fascisti, or "black shirts," as they are more commonly known, Fascios are being organized in the United States by agents sent here from Italy for that purpose. It was ascertained today by International News Service after an extended investigation.

This amazing effort, which already has met with a measure of success, is part of a world-wide movement.

Swear Allegiance.
Italians who join the Fascisti in the United States, even though they are American citizens and renounced all allegiance to "any foreign king," prince, potentate, etc., when they were naturalized, swear "unquestioningly, completely and unlimited obedience" not to the Italian government, but to the Italian Fascisti.

The Fascisti here aims to embrace every Italian, naturalized or unnaturalized, in its American group, and later, it is declared, it is possible to include other nationalities. It has branches already been organized by Mussolini's agents in New York, Chicago, Philadelphia, Detroit, Bridgeport and Waterbury. All American branches have been ordered by Mussolini to obey the New York branch, the headquarters, which in turn, receives its orders from Mussolini direct through his agents or from the Central party bureau's officials in Italy.

Bitter Factional Fight.
Over the objects which the Fascisti aim to accomplish here there is now being waged a bitter factional war within the ranks of the organizations already formed. One group insists upon strict obedience. It maintains that the militant group, in organizing primarily to fight radicals, may run in conflict with the laws of the United States enacted to handle such exigencies is not taken into consid-

Los Angeles Business Firms Leave Safes Open for Burglars.

A Meeting.

Labor Party Nominates Sinclair for Congress

Los Angeles, March 19.—Upton Sinclair, novelist, was nominated for representative in congress from the Tenth California district by the labor party at its organization meeting here. The party was launched at a convention composed of representatives of 71 labor unions and five delegates from the socialist party, a total of 227 participating. Sinclair ran for the United States senatorship on the socialist ticket last fall.

Sinclair lives in Pasadena, which is in the Ninth congressional district, but federal laws permit any citizen to run for congress regardless of district, it was explained. Sinclair, nearly three years ago, although a resident of the Ninth district, opposed the late Henry Z. Osborne in the Tenth.

New York, March 19.—Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, who has been seriously ill with influenza at the Lenox Hill hospital, had recovered sufficiently Sunday to leave his bed and take a short walk about the building.

"Father of Rail Publicity" Dies After Short Illness
Denver, March 19.—Major Shadrach K. Hooper, 82, widely known railroad passenger agent and sometimes called "The father of railroad publicity," died yesterday after a short illness. He retired July 1, 1907, after having been general passenger agent of the old Denver & Rio Grande railway for many years.

Major Hooper served in the union army during the civil war, participating in the battle of Shiloh and in Sherman's march to the sea.

As general passenger agent of the Denver & Rio Grande, Major Hooper placed pictures of Colorado scenery all over the world to advertise the Rio Grande. He also employed many newspaper men to travel over the Rio Grande line and write descriptive stories of scenery along that route.

"Eat More Wheat" Drive Planned to Aid Farmers
Chicago, March 19.—An "eat more wheat" movement is to be launched to solve the problem of what to do with the country's 171,000,000 bushels of wheat surplus, according to James F. Bell, Mr. Bell is vice president of the Washburn-Crosby company, with the largest flour mills in the world at Minneapolis.

Mr. Bell reached Chicago last night after a trip to New York, where he attended a conference at which preliminary plans for the "eat more wheat" movement were made.

The weakened foreign demand has left the farmer with his wheat on his hands, according to Mr. Bell, and he is being forced to sell the grain below the cost of production, while other commodities have advanced over pre-war prices.

Falls City Man Succeeds Hall on Agriculture Board
Lincoln, March 19.—President Graff of the state board of agriculture, following a special meeting of the board Saturday, announced the appointment of A. J. Weaver of Falls City as a member of the board to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Dr. P. L. Hall of Lincoln, for several years a member of the board. Mr. Weaver was chairman of the recent state constitutional convention, and has for a long time been active in agricultural and horticultural interests.

Senator Johnson in Europe to Rest, Not Investigate
Cherbourg, France, March 19.—(AP)—United States Senator Hiram W. Johnson arrived here on board the steamer George Washington from New York. Mr. Johnson said he had come to Europe after four years of parliamentary work to rest and not to investigate, as it had been held.

The senator left last evening for Paris, whence he will go to the Riviera and then visit Italy and England, starting on his return trip home June 7.

Royalists Planning Coup Upon Death of Lenin
London, March 19.—Russian royalists, anticipating the death of Nicolai Lenin, the soviet premier, are assembling in Paris to plan a czarist coup, according to the Paris correspondent of the Daily Sketch.
