

Butler Talks to Samaradick in Conference

Policemen Told of Policies and Assured Efficiency in Work Will Be Demanded.

Robert Samaradick, federal prohibition officer, added new complications to the police department situation when he arrived in Omaha Thursday morning from St. Louis.

Samaradick, who has been mentioned as a possibility for chief of police, telephoned Police Commissioner Dan Butler and arranged for a conference in his office at 3 Thursday afternoon.

What the outcome of this conference may be was agitating police circles.

Samaradick Silent.

Samaradick declined to comment on the rumor that he may be selected to head the police department under the new regime. He declined to say whether he had been offered any position by Commissioner Butler, or whether he will accept it if offered.

Samaradick headed the morals squad under the administration of former Police Commissioner Dean Ringer, and later was prominent in the war against run runners on the Canadian border.

More Recently, as a federal prohibition agent he conducted a raid on Hotel Fontenelle in search of liquor.

Trapp Success Williams.

Detective A. J. Trapp will take the place vacated by Sgt. Frank Williams, resigned, as head of what formerly was the police morals squad, with the rank of detective sergeant. It was announced Thursday morning following a conference of Dan Butler, new police commissioner, Capt. P. H. Dillon, acting chief of police, and Trapp himself.

The squad, however, will not be known as the morals squad. Commissioner Butler doesn't like the appellation. It will simply be known as the squad for central duty.

Heretofore it has consisted of four men, but Sergeant Trapp thinks he can get along with three, one of whom will be his partner, Detective Robert Munch.

Makes First Arrest.

Three hours after its organization, the new squad arrested Leo Young, a Chinese, on a charge of operating a gambling device. It was what is known as a "policy" game, a form of lottery.

Sergeant Trapp has been on the police department for six years as patrolman, motorcycle officer, detective and turnkey at the station.

Commissioner Butler Thursday also asked Chief of Detectives Charles Van Deusen to keep a careful record of the owners or agents of all property which is discovered to be used for immoral purposes.

Commissioner Butler announced his intention to proceed not only against the inmates of such property, but against the owners as well, under the provisions of a state law.

Butler to Policemen.

Talking to members of the first detail at Central station Thursday, Police Commissioner Dan Butler told the patrolmen that so long as they perform their duty, their jobs are not in danger.

"Your duty is to the city of Omaha, not to any one man or to any faction," he said. "I want to say now that there will be no politics in the police department. You are responsible only to your captains, to your chief and to the city commissioners."

"There will be no special sleuths sneaking around to see what you are doing. Your superior officers are responsible for your conduct, and if there are any charges to be made, the charges will come through them."

Staples Show Best Profit on Majority of Penal Farms

Washington, March 22.—Production and distribution problems affecting prison farms and textile plants were discussed in detail at group meetings of prison officials and others assembled here for a conference by the national committee on prisons and prisons today.

The advantages of standardized grades of agriculture products were stressed by Department of Agriculture experts and prison farm officials, both from the standpoint of profit from sales of surplus and with reference to purchase of supplies for the state institutions. Penal farms that show a profit, it was brought out, are devoted chiefly to staples, while livestock raising at such institutions is advisable in most cases only to supply meat and dairy products for "home" consumption.

Head of Steel Invents Dies En Route to Chicago

Toledo, O., March 22.—L. R. Steel of Buffalo, nationally known business man, died from natural causes on a New York Central train entering the union depot yards here early today, according to Coroner Charles J. Henseler, who conducted a post-mortem examination.

Death was caused by a ruptured blood vessel in the brain, Coroner Henseler said.

Mr. Steel's death came while he was en route to Chicago after conferences with Pittsburgh and Cleveland financiers in an effort to raise \$1,000,000 which, his associates said, he believed would prevent his firm from going into receivership. His efforts to raise the money were futile, it was said, and, giving up in despair, Mr. Steel started for Chicago to rest.

Income Tax Will Show Increase Over Last Year

Incomplete Receipts \$7,000,000 Larger Than Same Period Last Year—Total May Reach \$450,000,000.

Washington, March 22.—Income tax receipts for the first quarter of the present year, officially reported by the Treasury department today, now aggregate \$400,000,000, an increase of approximately \$7,000,000 over the same quarter a year ago and reaching the estimate which the treasury experts made previous to the date of payments. The final report on collections is not in the hands of the treasury officials, and according to their estimate based on the close of business March 21, will total somewhere between \$425,000,000 and \$450,000,000.

This approximately \$7,000,000 increase is due to the fact that in 1921 they were \$2,228,137,672, and last year they were \$2,086,918,464. If the rate of income tax returns for the present quarter is maintained, amounting to \$400,000,000 for each quarter, the total will be \$1,600,000,000, and allowing for the expected increase of \$50,000,000 per quarter will total for the year \$1,500,000,000. The decrease of 1923 on this basis, over that of 1922 will approximate \$236,918,464, while the decrease of 1922 over 1921 was \$141,219,209.

Judge Rules Jury Must Decide Fate of William Foster

Motion by Defense Counsel for Verdict of Acquittal Denied—Trial Ordered to Proceed.

St. Joseph, Mich., March 22.—William Z. Foster, charged with violating the Michigan criminal syndicalism law by assembling with the national communist convention among the sand dunes near St. Joseph last August, must face a jury's decision as to whether he shall go free or serve 10 years in prison or pay a fine of \$2,000, or possibly both.

Judge Charles White overruled a motion by Frank P. Walsh, chief counsel for Foster, that the court direct the jury to return a verdict of acquittal, and ordered the trial to proceed.

Mr. Walsh submitted 10 reasons why the defense maintained that no case had been proven against Foster by the state. He also cited court decisions in Michigan and Kansas cases to sustain his position, but Judge White held there was no similarity between the legal literature cited and the present trial.

The court also held that he could not pass on the constitutionality of the Michigan law against syndicalism, but that for the purpose of this trial, he would declare it constitutional.

Prussian Police Launch Drive to Thwart Fascisti

Government Worried by Growing Activity of National Freedom Party—Nearly Score of Arrests Made.

Berlin, March 22.—The Prussian government today made nearly a score of arrests in Berlin of members of the National Freedom party of Germany. The arrests are a result of the growing alarm in government circles at the growth of the fascist movement in the north and the open defiance of law by the communists in organizing so-called military "proletarian self-protection detachments."

These organizations are the Prussian fascist, corresponding to the Hitler movement in Bavaria. There was a great deal of searching of houses in connection with the raids, including rooms in the Reichstag building, and three members of the reichstag were among those arrested.

Friday Minister of Interior Severing, answering a demand in the Prussian parliament, will tell what the government proposes to do to suppress the communist military detachments in central Germany. With the election of the Dresden radical socialist, Dr. Zeigner, as premier at the head of an all-socialist cabinet, which has the support of the communists, Saxony is practically the first state in Germany to have a soviet government.

Part of its program is the formation of workers' military organizations to fight the fascist. In Munich the Bavarian government is unsuccessfully seeking to end the state of war prevailing between the socialists and Hitler's fascisti. The government is apparently not strong enough to suppress the armed troops which both sides maintain.

Police Search for Authors of Threats Against Small

Chicago, March 22.—Chief of Police Charles Fitzmorris admitted last night that the Chicago police have been searching for two days for the authors of threats against the life of Governor Len Small.

"We expect to have important information very soon," Chief Fitzmorris said.
