

New Animal Home, Unique Building, Open Next Week

Public Invited April 2 to Visit and View All Comforts It Holds for Four-Footed Friends in Trouble.

Nebraska Humane society is now in possession of its new quarters, the animal shelter located at Twenty-first and Izard streets, which will be opened to the public Monday, April 2. The building is designed like an English manor house, of red brick with white eaves and trimmings. On the first floor are located the general offices, the animal kennels, a kitchen, bath and hospital. Outside is the court, surrounded by a high white fence. The two wings of the building are runs, and in one corner is the isolation ward for diseased animals. The garage is connected with the remainder of the building by a roof over the driveway. On the second floor are the caretaker's apartment, an assembly room and the offices of the children's protective division. The building was designed by George Prinz, is unique among buildings of its sort and permits of expansion.

Hearings on Arkansas Rail War Concluded

Harrison, Ark., March 24.—Hearing of the "citizens' side" of disorders along the line of the Missouri & North Arkansas railroad incident to the strike of railway employees which culminated January 16 in the lynching of E. C. Greer, a striker, was concluded before a joint committee of the Arkansas legislature here and announcement made that the committee, after considering the testimony, would report its findings to Governor Thomas C. McRae. Fifty witnesses were heard during the hearings here, which began last Tuesday. Their testimony was in support of the contention that the "uprising" of citizens along the road and the formation of "citizens' committees" was a necessary measure to terminate the strike and was due to threatened financial ruin which it was feared would be caused to the section served by the road because of the suspension of operation as result of a series of bridge burnings and other depredations.

One of Denver Mint Bandits Now in Mexico, Woman Says

Albuquerque, N. M., March 24.—One of the men implicated in the theft of \$200,000 from a federal reserve bank truck in front of the Denver mint December 18, 1922, was in Juarez a few days ago and is now there or has gone further into Mexico, according to a purported confession made to Chief of Police J. R. Galusha of Albuquerque by Pearl Cockrell, alias Pearl Ward, who is under arrest here for investigation in connection with the robbery. In her alleged confession, Chief Galusha said, the Cockrell woman stated that she had fled from Denver into Mexico to escape the Denver police. She also stated she had met one of the mint suspects while she was in Mexico. She refused to divulge the man's name, but Galusha declared that further statements she made indicated clearly that the man she referred to was Roy Sherrill and that she accompanied him to Mexico.

Contractor Is Arrested in Chicago Bank Crash

Chicago, March 24.—H. D. Wolinsky, a contractor, was taken into custody by operators of the state attorney's office last night in connection with the failure, a few days ago, of the Sixteenth Street State bank. Samuel W. Maltz, former president of the bank, named Wolinsky as the man who secured a woman's signature on mortgages which the bank accepted in real estate transactions. Wolinsky, according to assistant state attorneys, admitted procuring the "dummy" signatures. Prosecutors said they expected to go before the grand jury next Monday and ask for an indictment of Maltz and possibly of several others connected with the bank on charges of conspiracy.

Peace Plan Endorsement Is Withdrawn from Dail

Dublin, March 24.—Dr. Patrick McCartan withdrew in the daily stream his motion endorsing the recent peace proposals from Munster, stating in explanation of his action, that hopes for peace had not been abandoned, but that speeches in the dail on such a motion might mitigate against a successful peace conference. Sir James Craig, representing Dublin university, declared a panic had been caused in the motor trade by the announcement that the free state would, from April 1, impose a 33 per cent ad valorem tariff on British motor cars and in consequence of which, he said, numerous orders had been canceled.

Liquor Raid to Result in New Probe of Murder

Los Angeles, March 24.—Oscar Land of Hollywood, arrested at Long Beach Thursday in a liquor raid under the name of George Hogan, was identified by police yesterday as the secretary of Earle Remington, electrical engineer and illicit liquor dealer, recently slain under mysterious circumstances. Captain of Detectives George K. Home announced a new probe into the Remington slaying would be opened. Louis Dudley, also under arrest, was declared by Prohibition Enforcement Agent Dolley to be "one of the most active and largest illicit liquor smugglers on the Pacific coast."

Driver of Auto Which Hit Girl Discharged in Court

J. O. Walton, 1921 South Twentieth street, driver of the car which struck and injured Laura Roseman, 3223 Pinkney street, at Twenty-eighth and Farnam streets March 2, was discharged in municipal court Saturday morning. Testimony made it clear that Walton was not at fault, the judge said.

"Spring Has Come" Chortlers Get Jolt

Washington, March 24.—Those who chortled "spring has come" were rudely disillusioned today by the weather bureau which announced that frost was probable tonight as far south as southern Georgia. Cold wave warnings were issued for northern and central New York and northern New England.

Mute Evidence Presented in Herrin Mine Riot Trial

By the Associated Press. Marion, Ill., March 24.—The record of a soldier, veteran of the Somme, St. Mihiel, Meuse and Argonne, who came back from the war only to fill an unmarked grave, was offered in mute evidence by the prosecution in the Herrin riots trial today and then withdrawn after a lengthy legal battle. Offered to establish beyond all doubt the identity of Antonio Mulakovich, in connection with whose slaying Hugh Willis, state executive board member of the United Mine Workers of America, and five others, now on trial, the record was contained in a stained, honorable discharge from the army found on the body of one of the 25 victims of the tragedy.

Radio Fans to Be Judges in Intercollegiate Debate

Newark, N. J., March 24.—Intercollegiate debating by radio will get its first tryout Saturday night from a broadcasting station here. Students of the New York university and Trinity college of North Carolina are scheduled to hold forth on the soldier bonus with the Southerners taking the affirmative side. The radio audience will act as judges and will be asked to write their opinions.

London, March 24.—The prince of Wales last night attended the ball of the American Legion in London. The prince was given a big reception by the 3,000 guests. He was introduced by Ambassador Harvey to Mrs. Chandler Cobb, wife of the assistant secretary of the embassy, and danced a fox trot with her. "I had a wonderful time," the prince said.

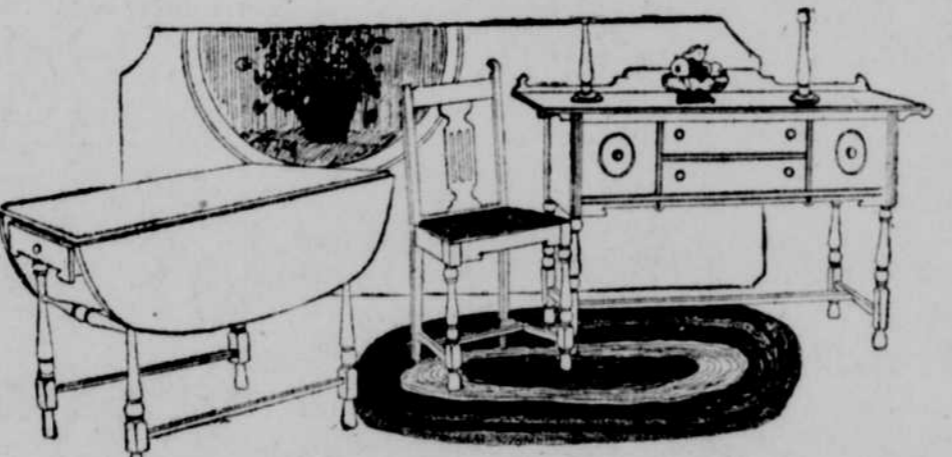

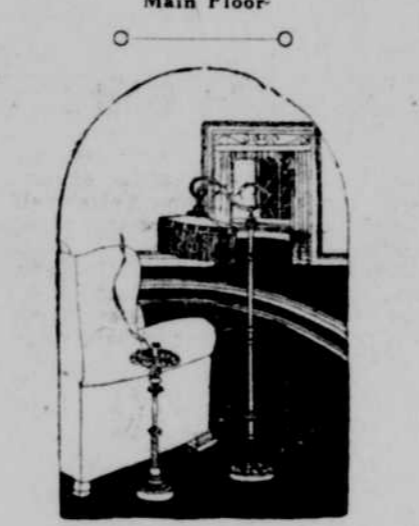
