

Great Britain Friend of Jews, Statesman Says

Lord Robert Cecil Declares Government Favors Establishment of National Homeland in Palestine.

New York, March 29.—Lord Robert Cecil, who recently arrived here from London, has given a statement to the Jewish press, which will appear in The New Palestine, organ of the Zionist organization of America, in its issue Friday. The statement says: "The British government and the responsible right-thinking people of England are for the establishment of the Jewish national homeland in Palestine. Great Britain will never withdraw from her promises."

Lord Cecil is also quoted as saying: "I believe that when the history of the war comes to be impartially written, the two greatest results will be the establishment of the national Jewish home and the creation of a league of nations. The two are not really disconnected. They represent the two great ideas for which we fought and by which we conquered—the ideas of nationalism and internationalism."

"It is most absurd to say that Zionism is dying," Lord Cecil declared. "Zionism is synonymous with Judaism, and the Jewish people have had sufficient experience to know that the opposition of its enemies serves only to strengthen it."

When asked what influence the attacks on Zionism had on British public opinion, his answer was:

"No influence whatever. Great Britain does not listen to the enemies of the Jewish people and of Zionism. Great Britain is a friend of the Jews, and a friend needs no explanation and to an enemy explanations are of no avail. The Jews, like all other people, must expect opposition. Has not Great Britain enemies; has not America enemies; why worry? The Jews, who have lived for 2,000 years in strange lands, must expect that someone will attack them. But they should be proud of the fact that they have good friends who will always be with them."

Weather Man Hands Out Gloom for Easter Morn

Washington, March 30.—Looking ahead to Easter Sunday, the weather man, whose forecast territory embraces eastern states, saw little last night that would comfort the average American woman and girl. The temperature, he predicted, will be "below normal."

Lowest temperatures ever recorded this late in the season, the weather bureau said, were reported yesterday from various points in the Atlantic states.

Locomotive Blown Up.

Buffalo, N. Y., March 30.—Two men were killed and another man was injured in an explosion which destroyed the locomotive of a Lehigh Valley freight train near North Leroy last night. The explosion was due to low water in the boiler, it is believed. Four freight cars were derailed by the explosion.

Ray of Hope Gleams for Easter Bonnets, Weather Man Says

Chicago, March 30.—A ray of hope for the annual Easter bonnet, supplemented with fashionable spring furs, was offered by the weather bureau today to the women of the great valleys from Indiana westward to the Rocky mountains.

"The weather Sunday will be fair but not quite so cold," said the district forecast, after predicting "fair cold weather until Saturday night."

The influence of the Alaskan cold wave, which had reached Alberta yesterday, today brought record low temperatures of 12 degrees below zero at Duluth and 2 below at St. Paul, snow flurries in some northern states and rain in the gulf states, weather reports showed.

In Chicago, with fair weather, the temperature early today was 23 degrees.

Edmund D. Hulbert Dies.

Chicago, March 30.—Edmund D. Hulbert, president of the Illinois Merchants bank, died here today at 65, after suffering several weeks from influenza. He was one of Chicago's most widely known bankers.

Stinnes' Visit to Rome Failure

Foreign Representatives Shy of Approaching German Magnate.

Rome, March 30.—The indications are that the journey of Hugo Stinnes to Rome was a failure, inasmuch as every one was shy of being approached by him, fearing that a meeting might be misunderstood.

It is learned authoritatively that Premier Mussolini has not seen Herr Stinnes and it is doubtful whether the visitor saw Elbert H. Gary. In fact the only certain point is that Stinnes had a conversation with Fred I. Kent of the Bankers Trust company, New York.

Judge Gary is on the way to Spain. It may be explained in this connection that the statement originally printed in the United States that Herr Stinnes and Judge Gary had met here came about through the misconstruction of a cable message from Rome when no positive assertion was made in the cable original.
