"BITS AND PIECES," a spectacular musical comedy revue, starring Jack Patton and Loretta Marks, is the headline feature in the current bill at the World theater. The act employs a big company, mostly girls. It was produced by Hazzard Short, producer of the New York success, "The Music Box Revue." The scenic effects are exceptionally elaborate, an entire baggage car of scenery and properties being carried by the attraction.

Jack Goldie, blackface comedian, is an added attraction, and his comedy chatter, singing and whistling finale make him one of the most popular entertainers of the day. Helen Hamilton and Jack Barnes present a refreshing line of comedy chatter under the caption of "Just Fun." Walter Law and company offer a powerful playlet, with big dramatic moments relieved by comedy. Posing in bronze in addition to original ideas in gymnastics are presented by the Rinaldo Brothers in their act called "Roman Art." Arthur Hays plays "Dreamy Melody" upon the great World organ.

The picture feature is a sparkling screen comedy written and directed by Rupert Hughes under the title of "Gimme." According to Hughes, the universe is suffering from an epidemic of the "gimmies," and in this clever photoplay unusual opportunities are given to Helene Chadwick, Gaston Glass, Eleanor Boardman and others making up the big cast.

Anniversary week, marking the first birthday of World entertainment, will be fittingly observed at the big playhouse next week.



"Shuffle Along" comes to the Brandeis theater for three days, starting Thursday, April 12.

This highly acclaimed musical comedy, with its all color cast, is described in one of the opening numbers "Simply Full of Jazz," for, while there is a jazz, it is not of too much consequence to halt the syncopated action which comes in the form of duets, trios, double and triple quartet numbers, with a jazz orchestra working overtime. John Vaughner is the tall, shuffling darkey who apparently wins the election, for he is installed as "Mayor" of Jintown, while his "sawed-off" partner with the funny little voice, holds up as chief of police. The "Mayor" assumes all the dignity his office calls for, and maintains a staff of singing and dancing stenographers who salame gracefully on every occasion.

The song numbers include: "Love Will Find a Way," "Honey Suckle Time," "Gypsy Blues," "Sing Me to Sleep, Mammy Dear," "Oriental Blues," "African Dip," "Mary From Maryland" and many others.

Billie Mae offer dance, color and speed. Their oriental tango is the feature of the act. Fries and Wilson are song writers, but theirs is not exclusively a singing act, although vocal work is a large element. A miniature farce, "Thanksgiving," is to be presented by William Carl, Olive Francis and James Dare. Known as the champion woman boxer of the world, Crystal Bennett is to be assisted by her company in presenting an act called "The Athletic Girls." The company will appear in boxing, wrestling and other sports. Once again the cartoon comic, Asop's Fables, will be a screen feature. Topics of the Day and the Pathé News also will be shown.

"A melodic pageant of sheer delight" is the phrase used by one of the numerous newspapers in criticising Mary Brown's "Tropical Maids," which comes to the Empress today for a run of one week. This company, headed by Mary Brown and Doc Dorman, comedian, together with a supporting cast including Gene Post, Joseph Barrett, Lew Lewis, Bert Devereux, Grayce Robertson, Annabelle Collins and others, not forgetting the chorus of 15 peaches, is bound to please. "Mary" has included in her company this season "those three harmony boys," who sing some "mean" harmony; Grayce Robertson, piano accordion girl; Doc Dorman with dances of his own creation; Frank Caggan, "the banjo king," and Lew Lewis, "tanglefoot dancer." A carload of scenery and costumes is carried.
