Two Home Runs and Wins Game

Charles Hartnett Slams Out Second Circuit Smash in Ninth-Winners Made Six Home Runs, Losers Two.



HICAGO, April 20 .-Eight home runs, one less than the world record 29 years ago, were made in the final game between Chicago and Pittsburgh today, Chicago winning, 12 to 11, when Charles Hartnett, recruit catcher, slammed out his second homer and crossed the plate with the

winning run in the ninth. The Cubs made six of the homers. while the Pirates gathered two. The record for home runs in a game was made by Cincinnati and Boston in 1894, when the Braves made five and he Reds four.

The Pirates used a trio of pitchers an effort to stop the bombardment. Glazner, who started the game, was nicked for four homers, while Hamilton, who gave way to Adams after Hartnett had cracked out his first homer, was touched for one. The veteran "Babe" Adams came in for his share of the bombardment in the ninth, Hartnett bagging the homer which gave the Cubs their third straight victory.

In addition to Hartnett's brace of homers. /Freiberg poled two, while Statz and Heathcote got one apiece. Grimm and Traynor were the home run hitters for the Pirates.

In the ninth inning, with the score tied, Kelleher lined to Russell, and Hartnett followed with the final smash, driving the ball over the right field wall, one of the longest hits ever made in the Cubs' park.
