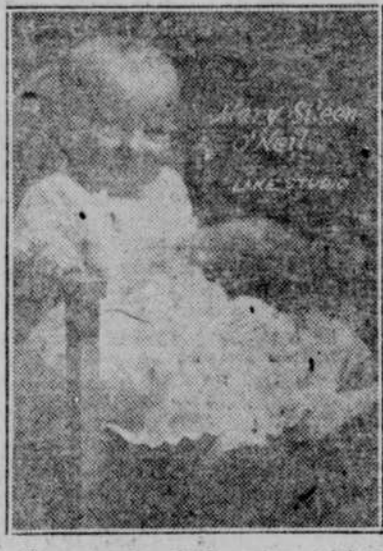
Former Omahans Guests.
