Cornhusker Tracksters Finish Fourth in Kansas Relay Games

Lawrence, Kan., April 21.—Nebraska university outdoor Missouri Valley track champs, played an important part in the scoring in the first annual University of Kansas relays here today. The Cornhuskers took off a first in the two-mile university class relay and second in the quarter mile and half mile relays, while fourths went to the men of Schulte in the mile and four-mile relays. Their record was bettered by the University of Kansas relay teams, which took first in the quarter and half mile relays, second in the mile, third on the four-mile and fourth in the two-mile.

The sprint relays were the prettiest races of the day and found the Jay-hawkers and Cornhuskers fighting it out at the tape. It was the best Fisher, Kansas sophomore, who turned victory to his teammates in both the quarter and half mile relays. In the quarter mile affair, Noble of Nebraska led till the last two yards, only to be beaten by inches by Fisher, who had been slowly coming up in the last 20 yards. In the half mile relay, Loyd of Nebraska had a two-yard lead on Fisher within 15 yards of the finish, but the Kansan put on speed and won.

Nebraska also scored in the special field events. Hatch of Nebraska took second in the broad jump by a leap of 21 feet, 9 3/4 inches. Turner of Nebraska collected three points when he took second in the high jump at 5 feet, 11 1/2 inches. Hartley of Nebraska also scored by tossing the javelin 166 feet, 2 1/2 inches for a tie for first place with Elkins of Haskell.

The Cornhuskers were fourth, high point school in the nine special events with 18 1/2 points. Kansas was first with 13 1/2 and Kansas Aggies second with 13. In the eight school class Broken Bow was the one of the Nebraska prep school entered to score. Broken Bow half mile relay quartet came through for fourth place in the half mile open.

Tech High Plans to Stage Tennis Tournery
