Wilderness Wins Chesapeake Stakes

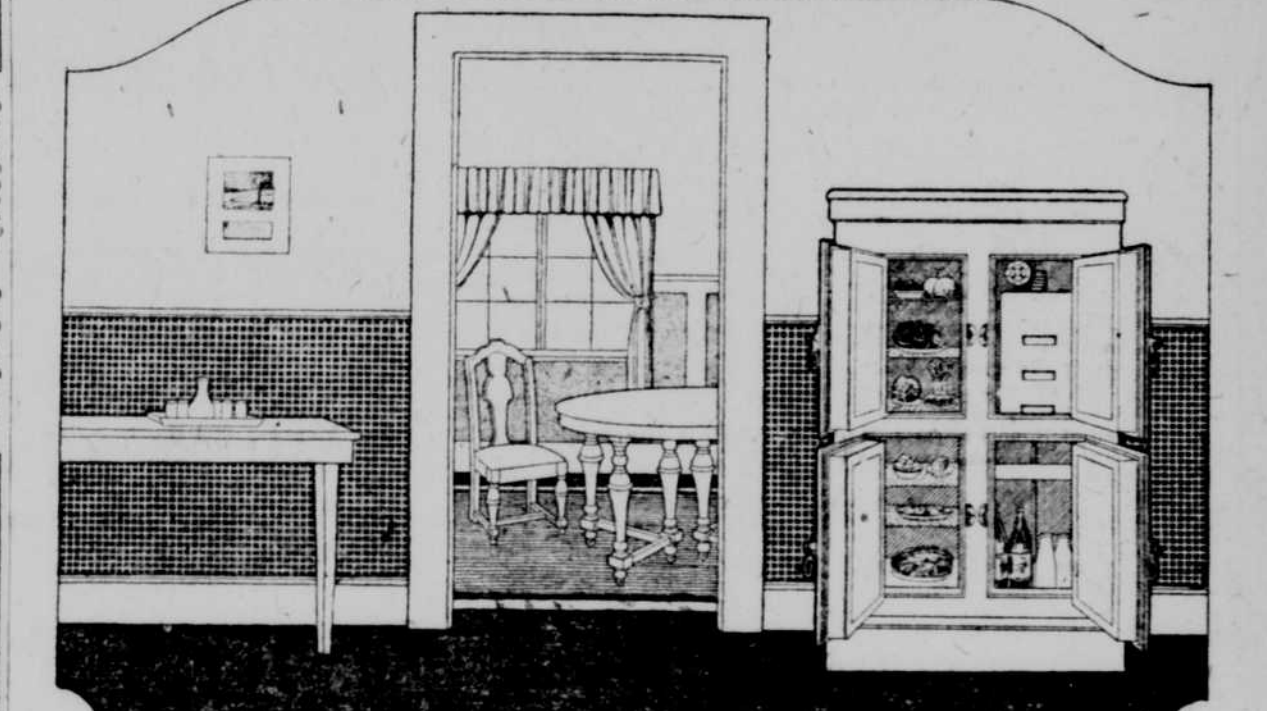

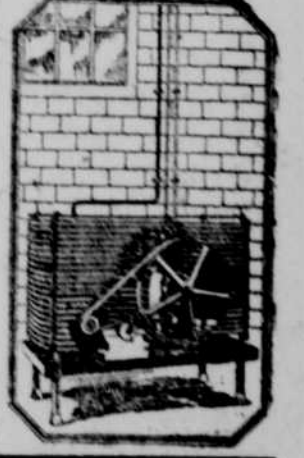
