Golf Facts

Q. If four players play together in a medal qualifying round, can the tournament committee refuse to accept their qualifying scores, in other words, disqualify them? A. The rules provide that medal play is played in pairs, and this rule is followed in all tournaments of any prominence. Occasionally, a tournament committee may find it advisable to allow players to play in fours. But it is justified in disqualifying such play. Q. In a recent tournament in which I played, two players had a dispute over the following point: On one hole one of them found his ball lying back of a dead bush. He was uncertain as to whether he was allowed to remove the bush and ask a spectator what the rule in such a case would be. His opponent claimed the hole on the ground that the player asking information was not his person other than his caddy. Did that lose the hole for him? A. No. A player is allowed to ask the rule on any situation that comes up. In other words, information as to the rules, is not prohibited under the hand making or willfully receiving information. Q. Please explain the system of handicapping where one player exceeds another a certain number of strokes. A. A player who strokes more than the player receiving them sees fit, instead of taking them as the card for the course indicates. Thus, a player who receives four strokes, can if he chooses, take them on the first four holes regardless of where the card allows the first four strokes. The player can use one or more of his strokes as one hole if he likes, but he must signify his intention to use a stroke before he leaves the putting green, if he is to use it on the hole. Q.
