

"Dazzy" Vance Whitts Fourteen Giants in Nine Innings, But Brooklyn Loses Game

Former Hastings State Leaguer Hurls Good Ball

Nebraskan's Strike-Out Record Best Made in Majors for Some Time — Champs Win in Eleventh.

NEW YORK, May 2.—Despite 15 strikeouts by pitcher "Dazzy" Vance, 14 of them in nine innings, Brooklyn lost its seventh game of the spring to New York, the world's champions winning in the 11th inning, 7 to 6.

Vance's strike-out record was the best made in the majors in recent years. Ten of his strikeouts came in the first five innings. Mammoux relieved Vance in the 11th and Kelly's sacrifice flight sent Frisch in with the winning run.

Golf Facts

Q. What is a player entitled to do, if he drives a ball and it rolls under a moving machine being used to cut the fairways, where the driver of the machine has stopped to allow the match to pass?

A. In a case of this kind, the player is entitled to have the machine moved, and if the ball is disturbed in moving the machine, it may be replaced without penalty.

Q. Is a player allowed to remove a lump of soil from a ball before dropping it, where he has lifted it from plowed ground posted as ground under repair?

A. Under U. S. G. A. rules a ball may be cleaned under any conditions only when a special order on the putting green, committee authorizes it because of playing conditions at the time. Under W. G. A. rules, a ball may be cleaned on the putting green, but neither makes any allowance for cleaning a ball lifted from ground under repair.

Q. If two balls lie less than six inches from each other on the putting green, can a single putt, in the same way as in the case of lifting his ball if he wants to, or must he lift and let his opponent play first?

A. He is required to lift and allow his opponent to play first.
