However, there was a better chance of commission houses buying on the breaks and the market did not go as low as yesterday.

New York, May 3.—Gradual but painful realization that general trade is contracting in various directions continued to cause professional shorts to attack the stock market. The professionals sought out shares which were in vulnerable position and hammered them down.

The success which crowned their efforts soon caused prices to tremble, following early strength in which the bulls took a prominent part. The declines resulting from the attack again induced general liquidation. Quotations seemed to possess less resiliency than on any other day since the inception of the break. Some speculation which had been "ballooned" to exorbitant levels on mere promises exhibited signs of distress, the declines ranging from three to five points.

Oil Shares Firm.
Relative firmness in the biggest independent oil shares strengthened the reaction to the weakness of the industrial group. Unsettled by the professional shorts to cover his short interest in leading oil stocks.
