

Armenian Relief Work Must Go on, Vickery Warns

Failure to Make Children Self-Supporting Would Be Death Sentence, Omahans Told.

Having saved a million Armenian children from starvation, the near east relief work will have to be continued until they can be made self-supporting, C. V. Vickery, general secretary of the work, told a group of Omaha men and women at a luncheon in the Brandeis tenroom yesterday. Mr. Vickery came from New York to urge that Nebraska continue its contributions of money, clothing and food. Nebraska farmers last year gave to these children corn valued at \$68,114.

"You must stand by this work or pronounce the death sentence on thousands of children," said Mr. Vickery. "We can't hold our own civilization if we are willing to see such ruin wrought overseas."

He told of an orphanage with 1,000 children housed in the former kaiser's palace at Corfu. A thousand boys in an orphanage at Nazareth are learning the carpenter's trade; at the very scene where Christ worked as a carpenter. Orphanages are scattered over Greece and in many parts of Asia Minor. At some of them the boys are learning to raise food. He told of Dr. and Mrs. Ganaway of Omaha, who have 10,000 children to watch over, and of Mrs. Flora Kelly, another Omaha relief worker.

Walter W. Head presided at the meeting. Howard H. Balbridge, chairman of the near east relief, spoke of the 60,000 orphans that had been saved by contributions from Omaha, and urged that they not be abandoned.

Star Witness in Pen Camp Beating Investigation Dies

Was to Answer Summons to Quiz on Martin Tabert Case—Fell Ill in Convict Camp.

Tallahassee, Fla., May 7.—Jerry Poppell, star witness against Sheriff J. R. Jones and County Judge E. F. Willis in the investigation of the death of Martin Tabert, died suddenly in a hospital at Quincy late Saturday night.

His wife and son brought his body to Tallahassee last night. They were en route from Tallahassee to Pensacola when Poppell was stricken. He was on his way to answer a summons by United States District Attorney Cullbert to be questioned concerning the death in the Leon county jail of Ned Thompson, who died while Poppell was jailed there.

Thompson but a few days before had been returned from the Putnam Lumber company's convict camp at Clara in bad physical condition. When taken to the camp from Leon jail he was reported in good shape. The district attorney has been looking into the Thompson case to ascertain if his transfer to the Putnam camp was a violation of the federal penance law.

Poppell was called twice before the legislative committee investigating Tabert's death at the Putnam camp and his wife was a witness once within the last three weeks. Both testified to alleged brutal treatment of prisoners in the Leon jail at the hands of Sheriff Jones and his deputies.

Poppell also told of drinking parties in the offices of Sheriff Jones and Judge Willis and swore they had been drunk "on the streets of Tallahassee." His last testimony was given last Tuesday. Late Friday Poppell, his wife and son started by automobile to Pensacola. When nearing Quincy late that night he was rushed to a hospital in this city. He grew worse Saturday and died late Saturday night.

Eva Hall, the only one of seven other inmates to appear, paid a fine of \$5. Others forfeited bonds of \$25 each.

After sticking it out as long as they could the younger two of the quartet left the court room when the Dillon hotel case was called. The other two remained.

83 Already Signed Up for Omaha C. of C. Trade Trip

Eighty-three persons, representing 60 Omaha firms, already have signed up for the Chamber of Commerce trade trip to start May 20, it was announced Monday.

The trip will cover 2,300 miles, and will include 34 towns in Wyoming and Nebraska. More than 100 representatives of Omaha firms are expected to make the journey. W. A. Babcock, veteran conductor of trade trips, will be in charge.

Shadow Gowns Again Popular at Sporting Events in France

Paris, May 7.—Coinciding with the abnormal heat wave, x-ray shadow gowns are with us again. This was demonstrated at the two great sporting events this afternoon.

The first was at the Buffalo stadium where the handsome Georges Carpentier staged the greatest comeback of his career by knocking out Marcel Nilles, the champion heavyweight of France. The second was at the Longchamps race course where the famous Cadran stakes provided an opportunity for an almost unparalleled fashion turnout, as well as a remarkable betting record.

It is estimated that the Americans in Paris lost a quarter of a million dollars betting against Carpentier. At least two Americans, Billy Halligan, the actor, and William Babcock, of San Francisco, cleaned up nobly at Longchamps.

The irreducible minimum has been attained in summer styles, judging from the models worn by the perspiring mamequins not only at Longchamps but at the Buffalo stadium as well, where a new feature was the inauguration of a fashion parade at the boxing bout.

Apart from the artistic elegance of line, the gowns exactly resemble the printed gingham once worn by Paris maidens, except that the voluminous petticoats have been abandoned, while a victorian touch has been given by a wide décolleté, leaving the shoulders bare.

Experts estimated that the average gown could be mailed in an envelope for 5 cents.

A record crowd turned out at both of the big events. Rene La Monnigne was seen at the ringside telling his friends about his jail experiences, while Senator Underwood was a notable figure at the races.

California Klansmen Hold Huge Ceremonial

Sacramento, Cal., May 7.—Members of the Ku Klux Klan, said to have numbered approximately 4,000, included large delegations from San Francisco, Oakland and Alameda, gathered in hooded array about a huge fiery cross 10 miles east of Sacramento, for what was characterized as the largest ceremonial ever held by the organization in northern California.

A flaming cross 40 feet high, with a 15-foot spread, lighted the open field where the ceremonial, was held and shone on kneeling klansmen for hundreds of yards in every direction. Far above the burning cross, a huge American flag floated in the glare of an electric spotlight.
