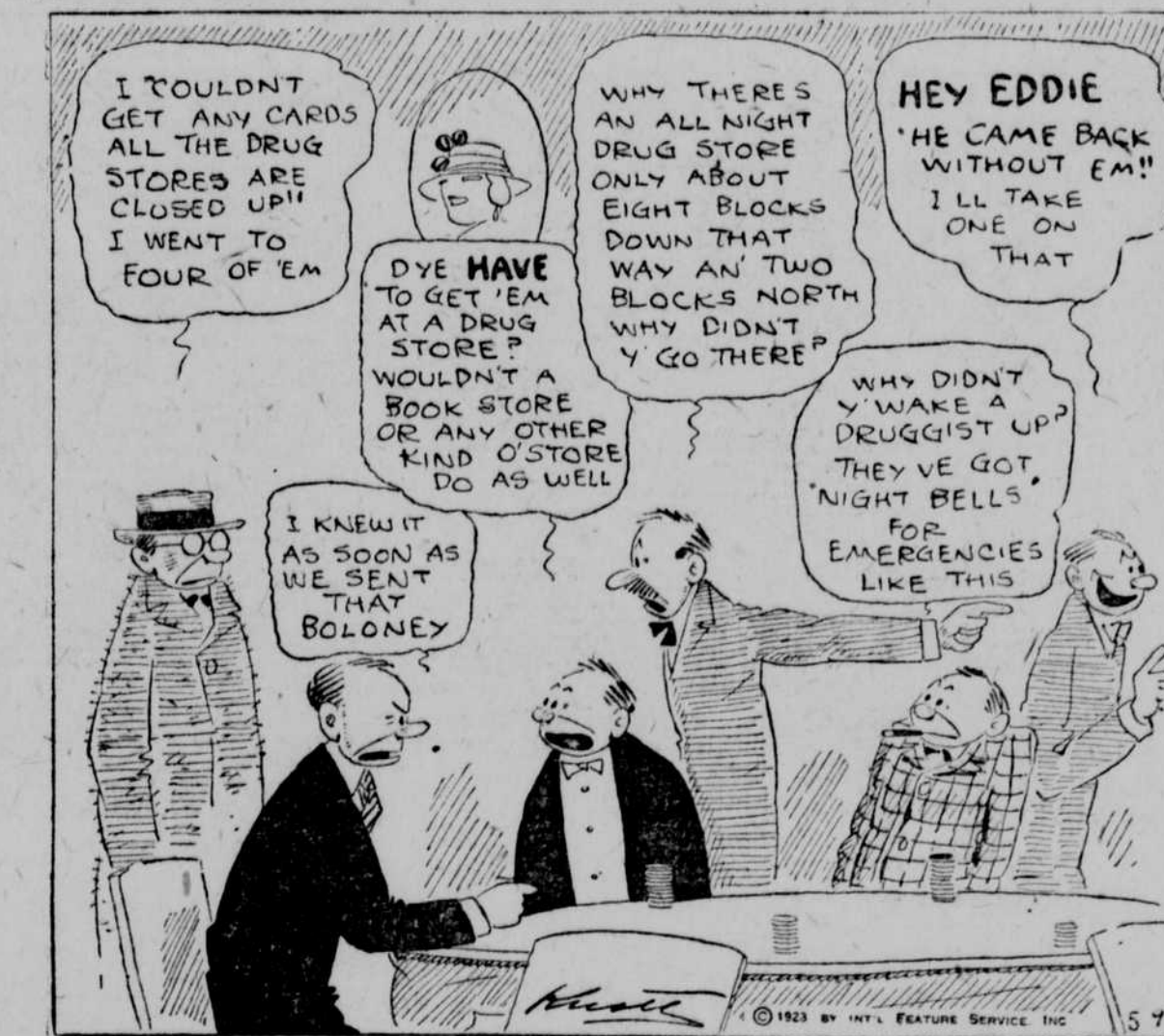

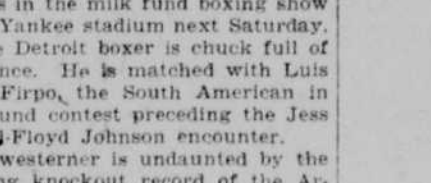
Trouble Ahead!

Occasionally a timber squirrel gnaws a hole in an overhead cable or a rat takes several bites out of an underground cable.

Boys shooting holes in overhead cables or workmen driving picks into those under the ground, are not uncommon occurrences.

When your telephone is in trouble, it may be in the instrument you use, but more likely it is in the central office, in a cable, or somewhere along the line.
