President Expected to Outline Future Policy of Administration - First Address Will Be at St. Louis.

fually decided on the itinerary of his western trip, President Harding has begun to give considerable thought to the addresses he will make enroute to the Pacific coast and in the coast

The itinerary, as now arranged, provides for speeches in about 12 cities, the first in St. Louis and the last probably in San Diego, Cal.

Although Mr. Harding has indicated he regards these addresses as somewhat secondary to the real purpose of the trip-his visit to Alaska-he, nevertheless, proposes to prepare them with care. Through them he intends to report to the American people on the stewardship with which was intrusted two years ago and also to outline the future policies of his administration.

As the first step toward preparation, he has begun to select the topics he desires to discuss and to assign them to the various cities chosen for principal addresses. In doing this the president is understood to be forming a policy of speaking upon a topic of special interest to the community of which the particular city is




