Y., May 16 .- "Repeal of state prohibition enforcement statute will be likely to result in more or less conflict between state and federal authorities," in the opinion of President Harding. The views of the president were expressed in a letter to Wesley Wait of this city, made public today. A bill passed by the legislature repealing the act is awaiting action by Governor Smith.

Mr. Wait wrote to the president urging that if Governor Smith would sign the bill congress should be convened and that the governor and members of the legislature who voted for the bill should be suspended.

"Every state official who voted for shall come hereafter. this bill is subject to the law of treason, having taken the oath to sus-States." Mr. Wait's letter said.


