

Fear of Marriage Caused Miss Hoyt to Jilt Britisher

Memories of Marital Tangle of Sister Said to Have Added to Fright of Washington Girl.

Washington, May 18. — An overpowering, physical fear of marriage and its responsibilities was the sole cause of the refusal of Miss Nancy Hoyt, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Henry M. Hoyt, to marry Lieut. Wiseman Clarke of the British Royal navy, here on Wednesday.

This explanation was made today by members of the Hoyt family to their intimate friends. The family physician is said to have advised Mrs. Hoyt that the marriage could not be celebrated without danger of a complete nervous breakdown of the bride on the very night before the ceremony was scheduled to take place.

For weeks Miss Hoyt is said to have been battling with herself to overcome this fear. This case is said to have been aggravated into what the psychologists call a "complex" by the memories of what dark wars marriage had led her older sister, Mrs. Elinor Elchorn Wylie.

Asked to be released, Miss Hoyt explained the situation to Lieut. Clarke and her family and asked that she be released from her promise. Startled and astonished by such a request, which the young man termed simply a "flimsy excuse," he refused to accede to her wishes and insisted that the plans for the wed-

ding continue. But the feeling of fear grew stronger, it appears, as the day of the wedding came nearer. Mentioning the preparations were going steadily forward for the ceremony, no one of either family deeming that Nancy might actually refuse to be married.

Miss Hoyt collapses. The Hoyt family, it is said, did not realize the seriousness of the situation until Tuesday when Miss Hoyt collapsed during a rehearsal of the marriage service. Consultations followed with physicians and the bridegroom-elect and his family. Lieut. Clarke pleaded that the plans be carried out and it is said even promised that it should be a marriage in name only until such

time as her nerves would permit the beginning of the honeymoon. But Miss Hoyt's condition was now such that she could not go through with the ceremony, and even while the guests were arriving and her circle of friends were on fete for the prospective "happy" wedding, the decision was made and the marriage was halted.

Laundry Appeals Suit of Girl Run Down by Father

Former inmates of South Carolina prison camps, now residing in various parts of the country, are writing letters to O. W. "Many former inmates have written to me of terrible brutalities that were practiced on them while inmates of prison camps in South Carolina," said Gangestad, who is only 22. "When I was there they treated me well compared to what some of the boys have written." Young Gangestad said he is gathering all the letters and will send them to the head of the Prison Reform association, located in Washington, D. C. "From what I can gather," he said, "a nice whitewash program is being carried out in the southern state and nothing is being done to relieve the situation."

Young Gangestad was an inmate of the South Carolina prison camp for 42 days. He was arrested while on a "gentleman's hobo tour."

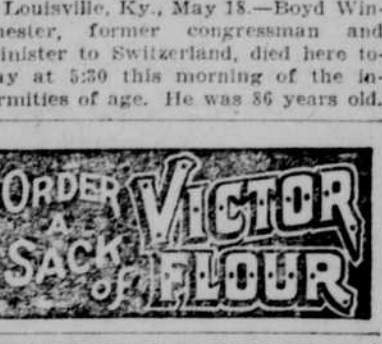
State Medical Society Names Blair Man President
