

Connie Mack's Athletics Trim Champion Yankees When Shawkey Weakens in Eighth Inning

Matthews' Home Run in Eighth Unnerves New York Hurler and Philadelphia Triumphs, 4 to 2.

PHILADELPHIA, May 25.—Connie Mack's young team today took another game from the New York Yankees, three of the Athletics' four runs being homers. The score was 4 to 2. The Athletics have now won four games from the Yanks out of five times the teams have met this year.

Rollie Naylor, undefeated Athletic pitcher, turned in his fifth straight triumph. Shawkey pitched a fine game for New York until the eighth, when he weakened.

The first local run in the second came when Welch put the ball into the left field bleachers. Listing the score, Dykes put the Athletics ahead in the fifth with a hit into the bleachers. New York tied the count in the seventh, but Matthews opened the eighth inning for the Athletics with a homer into the right field.

Horse With Name Like This Should Win Race

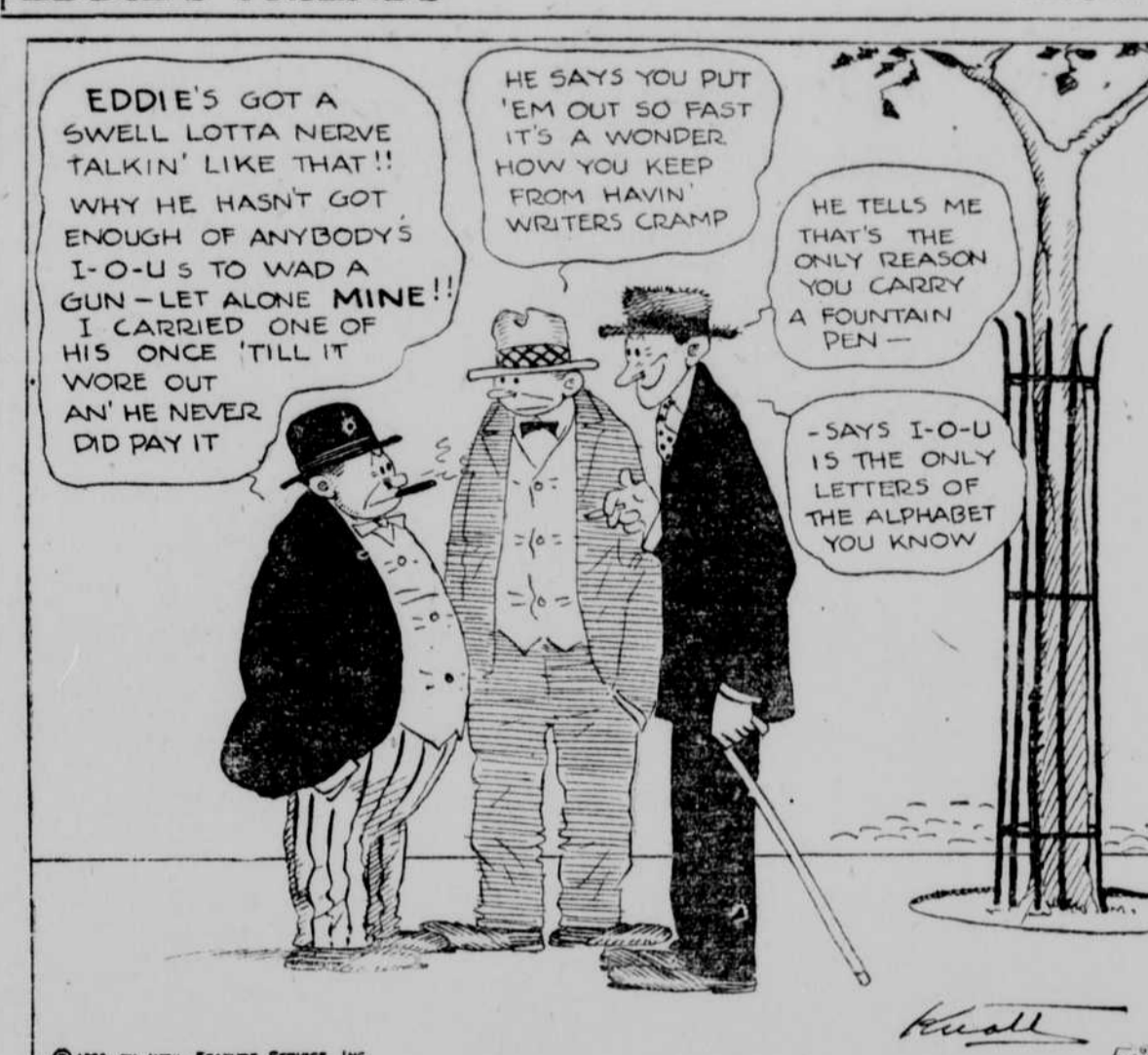

San Francisco Player Eliminates French Star in World Tourney.

ST. CLOUD, France, May 25.—William M. Johnston of San Francisco this afternoon hurled another obstacle in his effort to win the world's hard court tennis singles championship when he eliminated Rene Lacoste, the 18-year-old French sensation, in the semifinals of the tournament in four grueling sets. The scores were 6-4, 8-6, 6-4, 6-7.

Three stars remain in the upper half of the draw and a rare battle for the remaining two places in the semifinals bracket is anticipated. Henri Cochet, the French champion; Tegner, the Danish titleholder; and Washer of Belgium, along with Johnston, will fight it out in the semifinals. Tennis fans in America will remember that Washer was runner-up to Tilden two years ago in the world's championship at Wimbledon.
