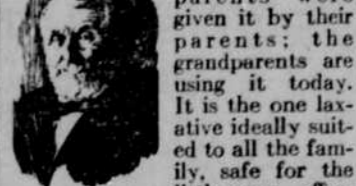

Another small hat is a short back poke of silk gros de Londres with a soft corded crown all-over embroidered in black stitchery. A side knot ornament is made of straw braid.

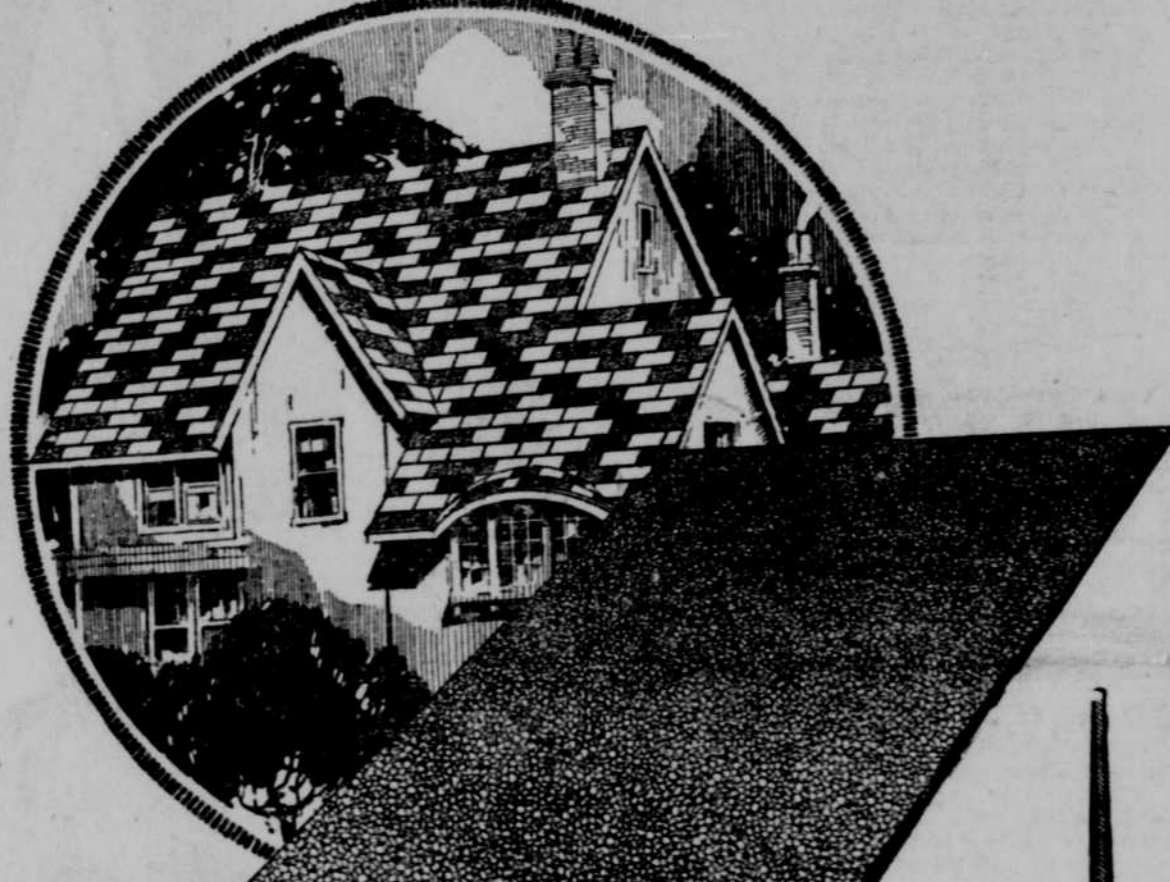
