

Harding Repeats Plea for Court

"By Joining U. S. May Make Largest Contribution to Civilization."

Washington, June 7.—President Harding declared in a letter made public here today that by accepting membership in the world court the United States "may make its largest feasible contribution to the stabilization of civilization while at the same time surrendering nothing of the advantages of independence," now enjoyed by the American people.

The president's letter was addressed to Bishop Thomas of the Gailor of Tennessee, head of the national council of the Protestant Episcopal church, who had written to assure the president that there were many thousands of citizens who deem it a matter of honor that in some way the American nation should contribute its influence to rehabilitate the countries of Europe.

"We Are All Human."
"You know we are all human enough to have the feeling that the man who agrees with us is the broad-minded and really intelligent person," the president wrote in reply. "Not many days ago I made the observation to my newspaper callers that I did not believe any man could confront the responsibility of a president of the United States and yet adhere to the idea that it was possible for our country to maintain an attitude

of isolation and aloofness in the world.
"It is my concern first that there shall be an effective recognition of this fact and that those who because of their positions are earliest compelled to realize this situation, may be assured the understanding and sympathetic support of the great intelligent public opinion of our country. Beyond that, I am keenly desirous that the right course shall be found, whereby our favored country may make its largest feasible contribution to the stabilization of civilization while at the same time surrendering nothing of the advantages of independence which we enjoy. After much of thought, study and conference, I reached the conclusion that our adherence to the program of the international court represented a compliance with these conditions.

A Longer Step.
"It is a longer step than some would wish us to take in this direction. On the other hand, it is a less advance than some others would wish us to take, but to me it seems to meet the requirements of our peculiar situation and permits us to the world that we are ready for our part in furthering peace and stability, without entanglements of surrender of policy to which we are long and strongly committed."

"I am gratified to know that in taking this attitude I have seemed to you to deserve the commendation you have so cordially extended."

recede from, and has not said that he is in favor of participation in the league, a harmonious adjustment is possible.
However, the national committee will be on the alert. Its chairman will claim credit for having stopped a stampede in the direction of too close a participation in the affairs of Europe, while maintaining at the same time that the world court does not imply obligations upon this government which the irreconcilables are opposed to. Mr. Adams and the party leaders have insisted that opposition to entanglement in European affairs does not mean this government is desirous of obtaining a position of isolation.
On the contrary, they hold the United States is more than willing to reach a helping hand out to Europe. What they object to is that in doing so they may be drawn overboard by the persons they aim to aid. It is like extending aid to a drowning man. The victim of the drowning accident is inclined to imperil the safety of his rescuer. On this basis an arrangement is possible.

Mutual Wives of Baseball Sheik to Do Hula Hula for Defense Fund

Two Pretty Women Plan to Aid Husband Charged with Bigamy by Sister Act on Los Angeles Stage.

Los Angeles, June 7.—When Nell Collins and Dorothy M. Collins, mutual wives of R. P. Collins, sheik of baseball, step before the footlights here next week and do the hula hula, the dance will be given for a positive, unique object: To defray the expenses of Collins' defense to the charge of bigamy, growing out of his marriage to the two pretty young women.
Also, if there is any money left, they may divide it between themselves for living expenses, until such time as Collins is able to assume the role of bread-winning husband without danger of again being thrown into jail as a tacit disciple of polygamy.
Collins is facing trial in Santa Ana, Gretna Green of Southern California. The two wives said today they had arrived at an agreement with each other whereby, if ever again they are afforded opportunity to wed Collins, they intend to leave it all to him as to which one he shall safely lead to the altar.
The two have decided to appear upon the stage as sisters and are hopeful the public will be liberal in its patronage, as they intimate fears it will be expensive getting the diamond sheik in legal condition for him to make the great matrimonial decision.
Collins will appear tomorrow before Justice J. B. Cox at Santa Ana for preliminary examination. Today, both wives insisted that, though they had been subpoenaed as witnesses for the state, they would do nothing to aid the case against him.
The defendant married Ruth several years ago but led Dorothy to the person only a few months ago.
Soon afterward Collins was arrested and thrown into jail and it was incident to the two women's visits to him there that they became "friendly enemies."

by the senate will be hedged with reservations which will make it possible for all parties to be satisfied, except the league advocates.
The democrats are expected to object to the reservations, which will be described by them as nullifying. But they will be countered by the explanation that the court is a step in the direction they wish to go; therefore it will be impolitic for them to refuse the half loaf, if they cannot get the entire measure they demand.
President Harding has several things up his sleeve which he will make plain on his western trip. He has long let it be known he desires an association of nations—not the league—but nations acting in concert for the benefit of peace. Such an association was represented when the naval armament conference was called. It is his belief that nations can act in concert without sacrificing their independence and initiative.
The leadership of the United States the opportunity to impress upon the world the principles of just dealing among nations which events and this country's power and opulence has given it—are not to be sacrificed. The president contemplates giving this message to the country on his western trip. It is expected to be a counter to the suspicion that has grown up in certain quarters that the world court represents a surrender of these principles. The president has been developing a far-reaching foreign policy which he will expound on his western trip.
