American Legion Board Meets in Lincoln

Mrs. E. C. Warner of Norfolk, president of the American Legion auxiliary in Nebraska, presided over the state board meeting held in Lincoln Wednesday, June 6.

Mrs. C. E. McGlasson of Lincoln, chairman of hospitalization and welfare committee, gave a report of the poppy sale, showing a net profit of \$700. Of this, \$100 was voted to the national hospital fund, \$50 to the overseas graves endowment fund and \$25 to the fund for placing a monument at Shiloh National cemetery for the Nebraska civil war veterans buried there.

The American Legion and the auxiliary wish to place a marker at Shiloh because Nebraska is the only state having men lying there without a monument.

The state president has sent out a request asking members of the auxiliary to remember the service men in hospitals when they are filling their own fruit closets this summer.

Mrs. Lucien Stark of Hartington, chairman of finance, presented a budget which the board adopted.

Mrs. H. R. Ball, department secretary, gave a report stating there are 200 active units in the state with 6,000 paidup members.

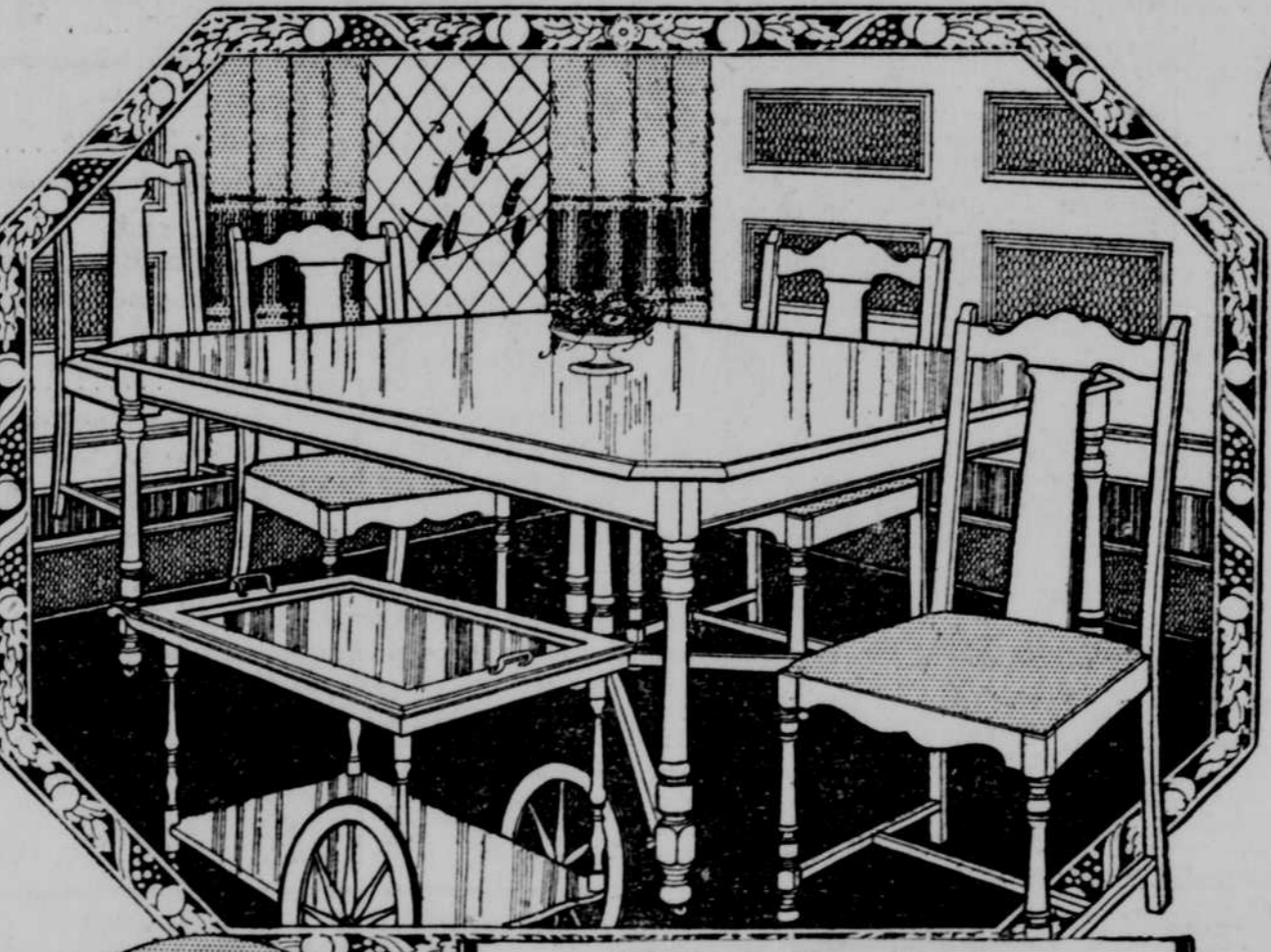

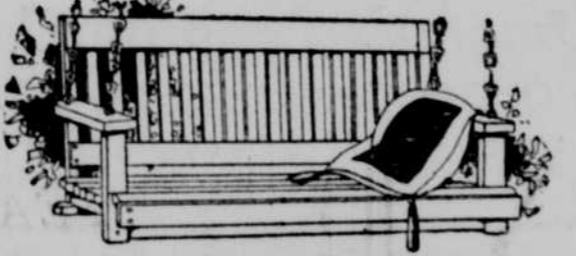

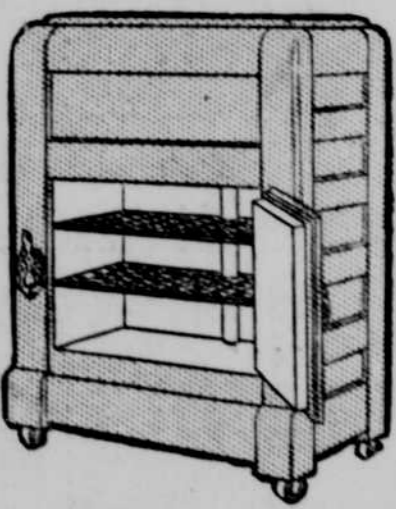
