

Misuse of Auto Scored by Judge at Grand Island

More Wholesome Activities for Youth Urged by Magistrate in Sunday School Convention Address.

Kearney, Neb., June 13.—Misuse of the automobile by young men was part of the theme of Judge Bayard H. Paine of Grand Island in his address Tuesday night at the state Sunday school convention on the topic, "Is the Young Man Safe?" The number of cases in his court involving young men and automobiles led the judge to say that more wholesome activities should be kept constantly to the fore to occupy the energies of young people.

"Instead of sitting back and finding fault with the younger generation," Mrs. Paine declared, "we should busy ourselves to discover where the training we give them is faulty and devise better plans for the younger generation coming."

The convention is getting well under way, with Prof. F. M. Gregg of University Place presiding and Chancellor Schreckengast of Nebraska Wesleyan university in charge of the Bible hour each morning.

Prof. Augustin Smith, of Boston, Mass., is in charge of hymn leading and instructions. His pageant, "The Light of the World," is being presented Wednesday and Thursday nights at the State Teachers college auditorium. Improving road conditions indicate a larger attendance for the closing day of the session.

Batrice, Omaha and Nebraska City asked for the convention for 1924. The board of directors awarded the prize to Nebraska City, the state convention having not been held there for 20 years.

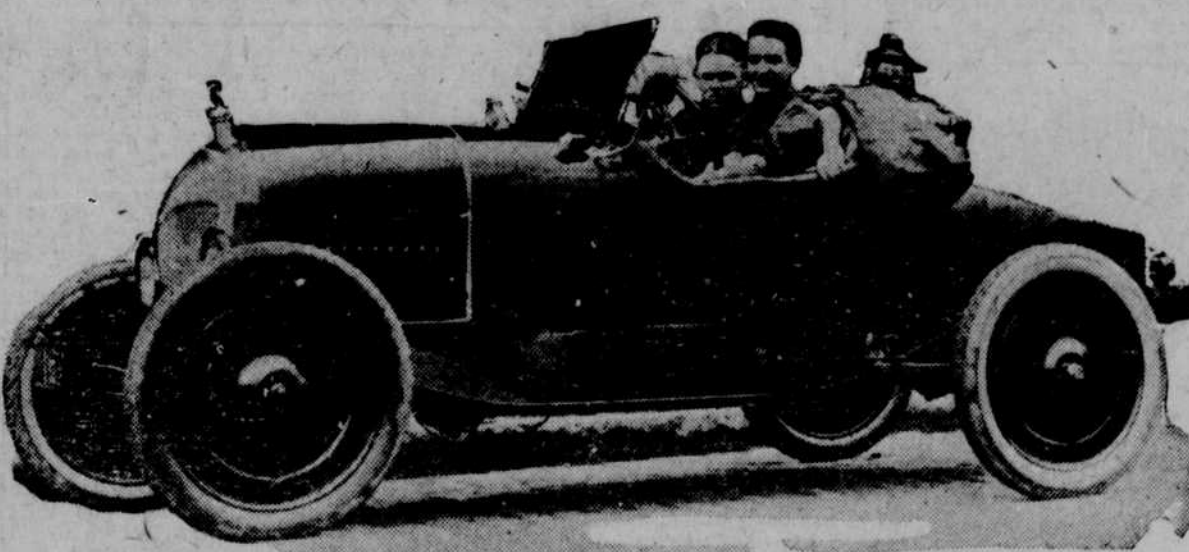
Change in Constitution.

Ex-Convict Willing to Undergo Knife to Rid Self of Theft Mania.

Although he says he has tried to go straight since he was released from the penitentiary at Lincoln five months ago, he is in the grip of a theft mania which leads him on to crime, Norman Taylor, alias Jack Lewis, told Chief of Detectives Van Deussen yesterday morning.

Taylor, who is 28, has spent two-thirds of his life in prison. He began his career of crime at the age of 4 by snatching purses. He told Chief of Detectives Van Deussen that when he was very young he received a blow on the head from a baseball bat, which he believes to be responsible for his criminal tendencies.

He said he is willing to go to any lengths to be rid of his mania. Chief Van Deussen took him to a hospital yesterday afternoon at local hospital a famous Omaha alienist was to examine Taylor to determine if medical science can restore him to normal mentality. If it is found feasible the alienist, who, because of professional ethics requested that his name be not used, will perform an operation free of charge. Taylor has agreed.
