In a great finish, Hagen played an iron shot on his second drive at the final hole, the ball resting within a yard of the cup. Smith Has Outside Chance.

MacDonald Smith, the California star, who had an 80 for the morning round, came back strong in the after noon with a 73, but his total was such that he is not given more than an outside chance for the title. Like Smith, the other Americans


