

# Annual State Women's Golf Tournament to Get Under Way At the Field Club Monday

## North Platte Entrant Given Favor to Win

Seventy-Five Women. From All Over Nebraska to Start Qualifying Round Tomorrow.

NEBRASKA'S women's golf championship bids well to go out of Omaha during the week at the Omaha Field club which starts tomorrow. Mrs. Russell Fowles of North Platte, semi-finalist in the 1922 California women's meet, has become favorite to win the title. During her short stay in Omaha she has cards of 91, 92 and 93 which Omaha women golfers consider good enough to win the title. Mrs. Frank Levings, of the Field club, defending champion, is accorded the best chance among the Omaha women to take the championship. Mrs. Johnston of Fremont is another outstanding player who may prove the successful winner.

Seventy-five women representing Omaha, Lincoln, Grand Island, Fremont and Norfolk will take part in the tournament, according to Mrs. Blaine Young, president of the state association. Entries will not close until Monday morning at 9 o'clock when the first eighteen holes of the qualifying round will be started.

The benefits and advantages of aquatics are so well known and so generally admitted that for the most part of them, a mere enumeration will be sufficient.  
Water sports develop grace, good posture, lung capacity and furnish the best all-around exercise yet discovered for both sexes from 8 to 80. They improve digestion, toughen the body against colds and supply healthy exertion from the most lightest to the most vigorous; all with little danger of over strain or injury.  
The most vigorous efforts in water are attended by less rise in blood pressure, pulse rate and temperature than in any corresponding exertion on land. Many of the benefits mentioned above come with mere vigorous play.
