

Wichita's Brilliant All-Around Baseball Team Takes Both Contests Off Omaha's Buffaloes

Pitcher's Battle Lost to Bailey in Second Game

Large Sunday Crowd Gets Treat of Two Real Baseball Games in Spite of Omaha Defeat.

ALDY" Isbell's league-leading Wichita Witches gave something like 5,400 baseball fans an example of the ball game as kept them at the top of the Western loop here yesterday when they defeated the Omaha Buffaloes in a double-header.

Doubleheaders are sort of a jinx to the Herd and the Sabbath day's double bill was no exception. However, the Buffaloes haven't got a kick a coming as the Witches played dandy baseball all afternoon. The visitors were backed by good pitching, and this, coupled with opportune hitting, gave them two games and the long end of the three-game series. Omaha won the first game Saturday.

May Driven Away. The Witches did their dirty work in the first two innings of the initial game. "Buckshot" May was on the firing line for the Buffaloes, but he wasn't on the line when the game ended. He lasted less than two frames. During the first frame May allowed the visitors two runs on two base on balls stolen base, balk and two singles. The latter, by the way came at the right times.

In the second inning, two singles, base on balls and Blakesley's double spelled three more runs and May's exit. Byron Speck took over the stormy sector after Blakesley's two-ply hit and from then until the end of the game hurled sweet ball. Speck allowed the Witches to scattered hits, one of them being of the scratch variety and the second a liner down the first base line. Not a visitor reached second off Speck until the eighth when, after two down, McDowell walked. Some poor base running also hampered Omaha's chances of a victory. The Wichita hurter was nicked for eleven hits, one a double by Brock, but of all the eleven bingles only one score resulted.

Three singles in the seventh, the third off McDowell's bat, scored five, who ran for Haie, with the lone Buffalo tally.

The second game developed into a hurler's battle between "Lefty" Sellers of Wichita and Abraham Lincoln Daniel Luke Bailey of Omaha, with the honors going to "Lefty."

Wichita repeated its performance of the first game and bunched hits for a 3-0 victory. Nothing happened until the Blakesley fourth, when Butler singled, stole second, and Beck reached first on Kerr's error. Mcullen surprised the natives by clouting out a double to center, scoring Butler and Beck.

The Buffaloes managed to save themselves from a coat of whitewash in the fifth inning. Kerr hit a field and Blakesley knocked the ball over the center field fence for a home run, thereby winning a box of cigars and a lot of applause from the spectators.

Brookins Sets a New World's Mark in Hurdles

Iowa Star Then Lowers It Three Seconds—But New Mark Is Not Official.

CHICAGO, June 17.—Seventeen men from the University of Michigan nailed the leaders' flag to their mast head today by scoring the championship track and field game at the National collegiate athletic association from a fighting array of picked men from 62 institutions of America.

The Wolverine stars, with 31 points, far outdistanced the field, often leaving dust in the eyes of competitors with teams twice its size. Leland Stanford, with another hand of 17 markers, followed Michigan in the scramble for points with 14 1/2, taking second position by a slim margin of a half a point.

Many Records Set

A new world record, and six new marks for N. C. A. A. games came out of the meet. Walter Brookins, star hurdler of the University of Iowa, set a new world record of 23.9 seconds for the 220-yard hurdle race, bettering by one turn, bettering by a second his own old world mark of 24.2 seconds. Within a half an hour, the brilliant Hawkeye clipped another 3 from the 22.6 seconds, but the mark will not be recognized because one of the barriers was upset.

Tie in Pole Vault

McKown of the Kansas State Teachers' college, and Brooker of Michigan, shared honors in setting a new record for the N. C. A. A. pole vault. The pair tied at 18 feet. Just six inches above the old mark, established jointly in 1922 by Norris of California and Landowski of Michigan.

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Poor Wins High Jump

Poor of Kansas belied his name, but continued true to form by winning the high jump at 8 feet 1 inch. His height was two inches better than that of the five men tied for second. Riley, Kansas Aggies; Leister of Stanford and Taylor of Grinnell were closely bunched in the 120-yard high hurdles. Riley's time is only eight-tenths of a second slower than the record established by Karl Thomson of Dartmouth in the eastern meet in 1920.
