

Isa G. Candler and Bride Off on Honeymoon

Romance of Capitalist, Who Was Sued for \$50,000 Heart Balm, Started at Office.

Atlanta, Ga., June 20.—Isa G. Candler, sr., wealthy capitalist and founder of the Coca Cola company, and Mrs. May Little Ragin, a stenographer, were married here this morning. It became known a few hours before the time set for the ceremony.

The ceremony was held in the chapel of the Theological building at Emory university and it was announced that immediately after the wedding the couple would leave for Washington, D. C., on a short trip.

After July 5, it was announced, the Candler will be at home at the handsome home of Mr. Candler in this city.

Mrs. Ragin is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas M. Little of Atlanta and since the death of her first husband more than two years ago, has supported herself and little twin daughters, Julia and Mary, aged 10, by maintaining a public stenographic office in the Candler building here.

It was in the course of her work that she became acquainted with Mr. Candler and this acquaintance grew into the romance which had its culmination in the wedding set for today.

Original plans were for the wedding to be held at the home of the bride's parents, according to printed announcement cards, but owing to ill-health of the bride's mother, a change was decided upon. Mr. Candler chose Emory university for the ceremony because of his deep interest in the college, which largely through his support has become one of the leading education centers in the south.

Interest in the wedding is increased by the fact that the \$500,000 breach of promise suit filed against Mr. Candler by Mrs. Onesima de Bouchel, a prominent society woman of New Orleans, still is pending in the local courts. Mr. Candler and Mrs. Bouchel were to have been married at Reno, Nev., last September, but the engagement was broken after announcement cards had been issued and the suit by Mrs. De Bouchel followed.

Head of Armour's Urges Feeding Grain to Stock

Chicago, June 20.—Turn one-fourth of the wheat crop to fattening the live stock on farms and the farmers' annual loss will be turned to a profit commensurate with the work of producing the necessities of life.

F. Edson White, president of Armour & Co., declared last night before the banquet of the national wheat conference, called by governors and representatives of various phases of the wheat growing and marketing industry.

Mr. White spoke on the problem of eliminating from the country the annual surplus of wheat, "which long has been the bane of the farmer's life," he said. "The carryover was in the neighborhood of 170,000,000 bushels this year, and we are now within a month of the new harvest.

"Feed more wheat" might not be a bad slogan for the farmers of many localities, he suggested. Charles H. Markham, president of the Illinois Central railroad, spoke on the traffic problems of the wheat industry. He advocated more scientific marketing.

Woodmen Circle Passes Resolution Against Wars

Resolution against wars of any sort was passed at a recent meeting of the supreme executive council of the Supreme Forest Woodmen circle in Omaha.

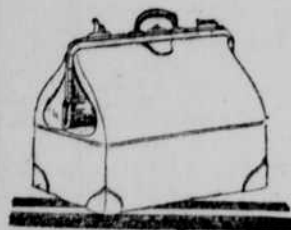
The resolution follows: "Whereas, in the wars that have been carried on from time immemorial thousands of our soldiers have gone down in battle; and

"Whereas, the mothers of the countries engaged in the great world war are pleading for relief from the terrible scourge of war and its devastating effects and are confidently hoping for some action to be taken that will bring about the ending of life and the perpetuity of the race;

"Therefore, be it resolved, that the members of the supreme executive council now in session go on record as endorsing any peace suggested by the National Council of Women or any other organization or meeting that tends toward bringing world wide and permanent peace."

Samardick Aide Accused of Theft

Chief State Witness in Rum Raids Held for Trial.

Sam Danner, 2008 R street, chief witness for the state in Robert Samardick's recent raids in South Omaha, and whose name was signed to virtually all the warrants on which the raids were made, was bound over to district court in South Omaha municipal court yesterday morning on \$1,000 bond, charged with larceny from the person.

He was arrested on complaint of Emil Schauland, merchant of Papillion, Neb., who charged that Danner stole \$120 from him in a soft drink saloon on February 23.

Witnesses testified that Danner once admitted taking the money, and offered to pay it back in \$10 installments. The offer was said to have been made in the Stanley Gager soft drink saloon at 2322 R street.

"What do you do for a living?" City Prosecutor John Marcell asked Danner.

"I've been working for Samardick," was the reply.

About 40 of his victims, who were in court at the time, smiled broadly when Danner was bound over.

Moving Picture May Save Man From Scaffold

Fate of Prisoner Held for Murder Hangs on Ability to Recall Details of Movie.

Chicago, June 20.—Upon the ability of Fred Thompson, who for years has posed as a woman, to recall the details of a moving picture he claims he saw may depend whether he goes free or is held to answer to a charge of killing Richard C. Teemer in a holdup.

Thompson, compelled to parade in his feminine attire before Teemer's widow, was positively identified by her as the slayer.

"I'd know that smile, those eyes, that voice anywhere," said Mr. Teemer.

Confronting the prisoner again later when the teletype stubble of a man's beard had begun to sprout through the paint and powder on his cheeks, when his voice had become throaty and masculine, she did not back up on her identification.

At Picture Show.

"Say that woman's crazy," bellowed Thompson. "I was at a picture show at the time her husband was bumped off."

"What was the picture you saw?" he was asked.

Immediately the prisoner reverted to the feminine half of his dual nature.

"Oh, it was the dearest thing," he simpered, "and the ladies wore the dearest costumes."

Today he was being questioned in an effort to extract from him proof that his alibi was true. The feminine side was uppermost again, however, and all of a woman's inconsistency and lack of logic were in evidence. Brushing aside the questions fired at him, he begged for a safety razor and a drink of gin.

Craves Drink.

The same craving for drink was being shown by Frank Carrick, who 14 years ago "married" Thompson and says he did not discover his wife's dual personality until six months later. He was sullen and silent, apparently realizing that beyond Mrs. Teemer's doubtful identification there is no evidence to link him and Thompson with the murder.

Thompson, 33, was born in Reynoldsburg, Ohio, and came to Chicago 20 years ago. During that time he has worked at many things—from cabaret singing as a girl to chimney sweeping as a man.

Run Liquor Blockade.

Atlantic City, N. J., June 20.—Two cruisers defied a fusillade from small boat guns and arms of a federal patrol and are believed to have landed a cargo of liquor valued at close to \$50,000 along the inland waterway.
