After a day of wildest confusion during which four government departments worked at loggerheads, 7,198 bottles of British ale, 284 gallons of English whisky, 47 gallons of Euro pean wine and 38 bottles of French liquors were stored in the govern

Dry forces seized this stock from the British Cunarder Berengaria, and the White Star liner Baltic. The two ships docked Friday, their "beverage liquor" for the return trip packed in the holds under British customs of Strike in Hard fice seals.

Agents Dispute Claims.

But whatever victory the prohibition agents may claim was openly disputed by the British crews.

Aboard the two vessels, in addition to their attested "medicinal supply," were 1,426 bottles of ale, 131 gallons of whisky and 118 gallons of




