

Bandit Snatches Bag of Watches

J. L. Borshelm, 4908 Chicago street, Jeweler, was robbed of \$1,500 worth of watches Wednesday night while walking on Thirteenth street while walking on Thirteenth street near the Chicago, St. Paul, Minneapolis & Omaha railroad. The watches were in a case he was carrying. The thief overlooked \$4,000 in money and diamonds.

Borshelm said a man slipped up behind him, seized the package and ran.

Ralph Sherwood, 3502 Cass street, reported a holdup in Turner park, in which he had lost \$70 in cash, a check for \$5 and a watch valued at more than \$100.

Sherwood declared that he was on his way home with Emma Sykora and had got off a street car at the wrong corner. While crossing the park they came to a large puddle of water and, noticing two men approaching, stepped to one side to let them pass.

Robbed of Jewels and Money.

One of the men pushed an automatic pistol against Sherwood.

The second man searched the couple.

From Miss Sykora the bandits took a diamond harp, a diamond ring, an onyx ring and her purse. She valued her loss at \$600. From Sherwood they took a watch, a lodge emblem, his money and a check. They returned the lodge emblem and three street car checks to the couple.

After the bandits finished searching Sherwood and Miss Sykora they ordered them to "keep quiet." Then they turned their attention to pedestrians. Four more persons were robbed while Sherwood and Miss Sykora stood there. Finally the bandits ordered Sherwood to "beat it through the park." As he turned to leave one of the bandits threw something at him and called to him to hurry. He did not know what happened to the other victims.

Police Commissioner Dan Butler refused to make known the names of any of the holdup victims and insisted that he wished people to know that the town was free from robbers.

Bert Cole, Noted Airmen, Killed

Denver, June 28.—Bert Cole, widely known aviator, and George Lawley, his mechanic, were instantly killed here last evening when their airplane crashed from a height estimated at 2,500 to 3,000 feet.

The plane was in flames when spectators arrived at the scene of the crash in the east part of the city.

The two flyers had been in the air about an hour, having started from the Curtis-Humphreys landing field. They had been doing stunt flying and had headed back toward the field when the pilot evidently decided to try one more stunt.

Hundreds of residents who were watching the plane saw it soar upward, then one wing was seen to break loose and the machine began to dive earthward. It turned over twice in mid air and landed on its nose at the edge of a small corn field.

Cole, the pilot of the ill-fated airplane, was commissioned a captain in the 120th observation squadron of the Colorado National Guard just four hours and a half prior to his death. An hour after the time he was killed he was to have been mustered in with other officers at the army here.

Friends of the dead pilot said he was elated over his commission as captain and that probably the desire to celebrate a bit by doing stunts in the clouds caused him to overtax the strength of his machine, resulting in the breaking of a wing and the fatal fall.

Bryan to Act on Court Martial

Lincoln, June 28.—Governor Charles W. Bryan, as commander-in-chief of the Nebraska National guard, soon is to pass upon the action of the first general court-martial held in this state. This is the first general court-martial held in Nebraska since the establishment of the Nebraska National guard in Lincoln, 1923, at the Army in Lincoln. The general court-martial convened June 15 to hear the case, which was continued over until Wednesday, June 28.

The trial lasted until the following day, when Private Strubbe was found guilty of the charges and a fine of \$50 imposed. Under the law the maximum sentence which could have been imposed was a fine of \$500 or imprisonment in jail for a year or discharge from the National guard. The dishonorable discharge would have meant loss of citizenship for the accused. Maj. Marcus L. Pottier sat as judge advocate general.

Holding of the general court-martial was made possible when the 1921 state legislature adopted as the basis for disciplining the Nebraska National guard the articles of war, which are a part of the federal statutes. The action of the legislature was pursuant to the national defense act of 1920, under which the National guard of the United States was reorganized.

The articles of war provide that the actions and findings of general court-martial shall be subject to review by the commanding general of the territory within which the court sits. In this case the commanding general, or corresponding civilian official who is given the title of commander-in-chief, is Governor Bryan.

Storm Hits Missouri; Several Persons Hurt

Joplin, Mo., June 28.—One man probably fatally hurt, several others slightly injured and perhaps a dozen cities and towns in southwest Missouri slightly damaged, with almost a score in darkness, seemed late last night to be the chief toll of a terrific rain and wind storm which struck shortly before dark and in some sections reached tornado proportions.

Telegraph lines in almost all directions from Joplin were down and reports to get in touch with outlying towns proved futile except in a few instances.

The storm apparently struck its heaviest blow north and northeast of Joplin, with Carthage and Webb City each being hit by a terrific gale. Large trees in both cities were uprooted, plateglass windows shattered and outbuildings blown away.

World's Youngest Tourist Born in Bluffs to Make Trip to Pacific Coast

Guy 'Slim' Kay's Slayer 'Unknown'

Lincoln, June 28.—"Walking Buffalo" sits in his tepee over on Capitol Hill, directing the machinery of the paleface government and attending to the business of making Nebraska a better and better state. No one would suspect that he is an Indian, for he looks much like any other governor.

To the hundreds of thousands of paleface friends and fellow Nebraskans he may be Governor Charles W. Bryan, but to the chiefs and other members of the Sioux tribe he is "Walking Buffalo," a full fledged member of the tribe and a brother. The Sioux tribe adopted him at a recent meeting at Niobrara, and the chief of the tribe conferred upon the new member his own name.

The adoption was accompanied with much ceremony. The older members of the tribe were dressed in full regalia and painted with the colorful tints which mean intense sincerity. And when members of the Sioux tribe came down to Lincoln, as they sometimes do, to find equitable adjustment of their claims or claims against them, they will look for a brother in the big stone tepee on Capitol Hill.
