D.S. Condron, 85, Dies at Milford Was Veteran of Civil War and Long Resident of Omaha.

David Stuart Condron, 85, civil war veteran, for 35 years a resident of Omaha, died Thursday at Milford, Neb., after an illness of two years. He leaves his wife and five children, Mrs. A. V. Shotwell, 3719 Mason street, and Mrs. W. C. Lambert, 1015 South Thirty-sixth street, of Omaha; another daughter lives in Chicago and two sons in Wyoming. Mr. Condron was born in Hollidaysburg, Pa., in 1838. He was educated at Davenport college, Ia., where he was a close companion of former Governor E. P. Savage of Nebraska. He and Mr. Savage maintained the closest of friendships throughout life. When the civil war came, he left school to join the Second Iowa infantry with which he served four years.

The young soldier was said to have been one of the most marvelous tenors of his time. He appeared at many entertainments given while the north and south were fighting. He once sang "Home Sweet Home" for the author, who declared that he had given the truest conception of the song that he had ever heard. Mr. Condron had been an invalid for the last two years and under constant medical care. Funeral services will be held this morning at 10 o'clock from the home of Mrs. W. C. Lambert, 1015 South Thirty-sixth street. Rev. R. L. Wheeler of the Wheeler Memorial church will officiate. Interment will be at West Lawn cemetery.

Record for Federal Cases Shattered in Omaha Court

Figures compiled by the district attorney's office Friday show that records for cases tried and for convictions obtained were shattered during the government fiscal year ending June 30. According to the figures gathered by District Attorney J. C. Kinsler to be sent to the attorney general's office, 821 new criminal cases were started during the past year and 779 of the cases were terminated. Two hundred and ten civil cases in which the government was the plaintiff were started during the same period and 189 were terminated.
