





The damage to crops had not been determined late tonight but insurance companies estimate the loss at more than \$100,000



Eppley Lincoln, July 11 .- Trustee F Baylor, through his counsel, Alvin Johnson, presented a report in bankruptcy in the federal court yesterday, adverse to acceptance of the bid of Eugene C. Eppley for the Nebraska Hotel company properties. scholders presented a petition asking that the Eppley bid be accepted. The creditors asked for a sale on the grounds that the hotels were out of repair, were depreciating in value: that accumulated taxes wer drawing 10 per cent interest and that the Fonetnelle lease was depreciating at the rate of \$2,000 a month.
