

# Clarence Peters, 1923 Medalist, Defeated Eugene Slattery in Second Round

## Many Favorites Are Dropped From Play During Day

### But Three Former Champions Left Among Eight Unbeaten in Championship Flight

**ETHRONING** favorites proved an interesting pastime in the championship flight of the state golf tournament at the Omaha Country club yesterday. Play which reached the eighth in the third round and of this number remaining in the competition but three are former state title holders. Two of these will meet in a 36-hole match today and one is sure to be dropped, while the third is conceded only a chance to win his match.

The biggest upset of the day came in the second round match when Clarence Peters, medalist in the 1923 tournament, was dropped out of the running when he lost to Dr. Eugene Slattery, Omaha Field club, 2 up and 1 to play.

Peters, whose medal 146 for the qualifying round, broke the state record, was badly off his game yesterday. In his first round match he barely defeated Nass Young of the Country club, 1 up on the 18th. His putting was bad and his iron work was not up to his standard. During his afternoon encounter he met the stiffest competition in the young dentist, fighting on even terms until the 16th, where Slattery took a birdie 2 and was 1 up. Then Benson young ended the match on the next hole with 4 against Peters' 5.

John W. Redick, veteran of many a golf battle on Omaha and other links, fell in the second round before the deadly putting of Jack Hughes, 5 up and 4 to play.

Cap W. J. Foye took the measure of Francis Gales in the second round won 2 and 1. Jerry Magee suffered defeat when Harry Donovan, Fontenelle entrant, won 3 up and 4 to play.

One of the most interesting matches of the tournament is on the schedule for today when Sam Reynolds and Ralph Peters are scheduled for a 36-hole match. Sam won his way into the second round by defeating Wally Shepard of Lakona, 4 and 3 and through the second round by dropping Foye Porter of Happy Hollow, 2 and 1.

Ralph Peters won from Edward Lyman of Fontenelle, 2 up in the morning round, and from J. T. Bertwell of Happy Hollow, 8 and 7, in the afternoon.

The two outstate entries to qualify were defeated in the first round of match play. Dr. L. Nelson of Norfolk lost to Slattery, 7 and 5. Phil Aiken of Lincoln was put out by W. E. Millard, Jr., by 4 and 2.

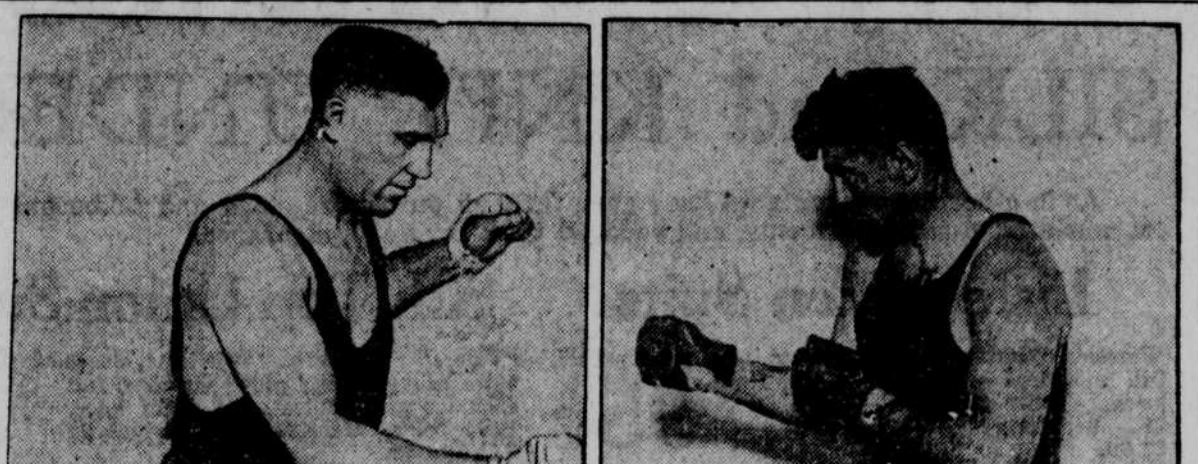
