

### Wide Sweep of Ballot Broom Being Planned

#### Conference for Progressive Political Action Will Launch Campaign.

Washington, July 15.—Flushed with successes in the last elections, the Conference for Progressive Political Action, founded only a year ago, is laying plans for a great political campaign in 1924 which will extend to every state and every congressional district in the country, according to a statement from headquarters here. "Of course," the statement said, "conference workers realize their campaign in 1922 was only a skirmish and preliminary to the greater contest that they will wage in the coming presidential year.

"In that year meddlers, muddlers and nutts who dance as marionettes to the music of dictatorial corporations will be swept out of congress, the federal departments and the White House."

"The conference is headed by William H. Johnston, president of the International Association of Machinists. Warren S. Stone, grand chief of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers, is treasurer. Men and women prominent in the so-called "progressive thought" circles of the country are included in the membership of the national committee.

"Throughout the statement strikes a highly confident note, predicting 'the year 1924 will become memorable as the year when every-day Americans will assert their political independence and take control of their own government, without interference' or dictation from a minority of case-conscious wealth manipulators."

"Not only will 'the people take a greater responsibility unto themselves and participate in all the affairs of public life so that a real reign of law and order will prevail,' but it is the plan 'that administrative government, controlled by special privilege, manipulated under private license for the personal profit of the financial and social 'blobs,' must be ended for all time in these United States."

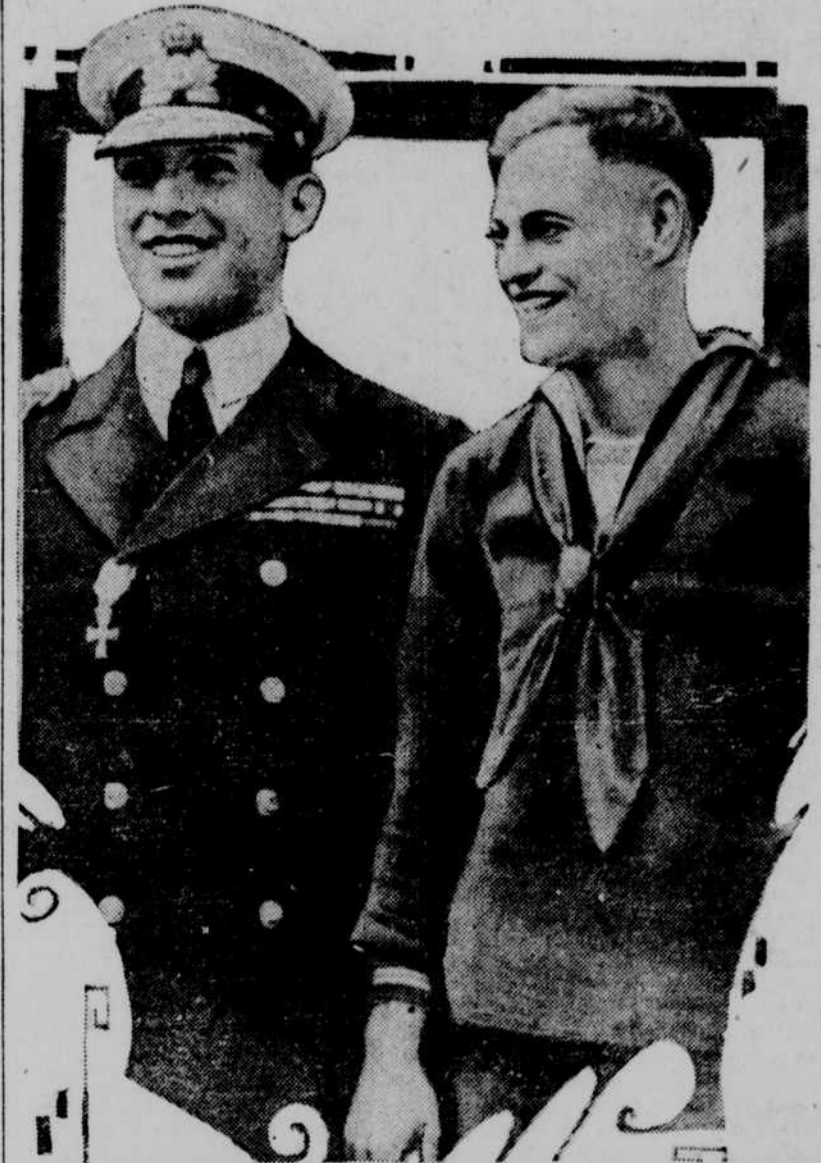
"Experiences gained in 1922 have convinced the most stupid and the most bigoted observers that the working people refuse to be party idolators or pawns upon the political chess-board of money lords, landlords and industrial lords," the statement declared.

### St. Paul Youth Unwilling Gland Operation Victim

St. Paul, Minn., July 16.—John Albronski, a young Polish laborer, staggered into police headquarters at 6 a. m. today saying he was the unwilling victim of a gland operation last night. Police say an immediate investigation revealed the truth of his assertions, and they are looking for the person who is supposed to have the gland transferred to his own body.

Talking brokenly, he told how when he was sleeping alone in his home he suddenly awoke to find two men cutting him. He says he fought like a maniac to get free, but he was just too late.

The police called a doctor and Albronski was hurried to the Lowry building. A couple of hours later there was a hurry up call for the police ambulance and the unfortunate man now is suffering from blood poison at Ancker hospital. He may die.

### Capt. Woodburn Transferred.

### Ku Klux Klan Ignores N. M. Governor's Order

By Associated Press. Albuquerque, N. M., July 16.—Despite Governor Hinkle's warning to the sheriff of Quay county to permit no Ku Klux Klan demonstration, a special dispatch to the Albuquerque Herald says 3,000 witnessed an initiation four miles from Tucuman last Friday night.

The ceremonies were held in a pasture four miles out on the Logan road, which, it is said, has been leased by the Klan. The members taking part in the ceremonies wore full regalia, despite the fact that there is a state law against the wearing of masks or robes. The meeting, the dispatch says, was announced by megaphone from an automobile driven through the streets of Tucuman.

### Members Resign as Result of Clash in Views With U. S. Governor-General.

Manila, July 16.—Following almost continuous conference for the past 48 hours at the home of Manuel Quezon, president of the senate and Filipino political leader, the Philippine cabinet, with the exception of Vice Governor Eugene A. Gilmore, who is secretary of public instruction, signed a document tendering their resignations, which was submitted to Governor-General Leonard Wood today.

This marks a crisis in the relationship between the governor general and Filipino governmental participation, which has been strained some months and presents a problem that probably only congress or the president will be able to solve.

It was understood today that Quezon and Speaker Roxas of the house will tender their resignations from the board of control, of which Governor Wood is the third member, thus leaving Governor Wood without constitutional co-operators in the conduct of the government.

Since Quezon controls the legislature that body is not expected to cooperate with the governor general. Mayor Fernandez also resigned today. Apparently Senate Leader Quezon is the moving spirit in the effort to shear the governor general of his powers.

Governor Wood's offices had no comment to make early today. It was understood an effort was being made to patch up the differences existing over the reinstatement of Officer Conley, American head of the gambling squad. Conley was prosecuted by Secretary of the Interior Jose Laurel on what was declared to have been a "frameup" and when the prosecution failed, Governor Wood asked his reinstatement.

A peculiar development is that the same board which recommended Conley's reinstatement now recommends his discharge. Governor Wood stated he was puzzled over this change in attitude.

A strong possibility existed today that the outward break between the governor and the cabinet may be patched up, but it was conceded that at the bottom the situation was serious.

### Stereotypers in Annual Session

#### International Convention Opens With 100 Delegates Present.

The International Stereotypers' and Electrotypers' union convened at the Castle hotel yesterday and spent the morning in organizing the convention. Mayor James Dahlman delivered an address of welcome to the delegates in behalf of the city. James J. Free of Caldwell, N. J., international president of the union, also spoke, so did Sheriff Loy H. Bailey, president of the Omaha Stereotypers' union No. 24, and C. H. Sumner of Kansas City, international secretary and treasurer.

A report was heard from the credentials committee. The delegates were guests of Samson at the Ak-Sar-Ben show last night.

About 100 delegates many of them accompanied by their families, are attending the convention. The main purpose of the meeting is to discuss the affairs of the industry and to amend the by-laws of the organization.

### Flashy Career of Noted Forger Brought to Close

Pittsburgh, July 15.—How an escaped convict and notorious forger was received in the homes of many of the wealthy families throughout the country, how he gave elaborate musicals, spent money lavishly in dining and dining many of the foot-light stars, was brought to light here Saturday night through the arrest of Dr. James W. Bradley.

Dr. Bradley, who had been posing as a wealthy New York physician

with offices in the Astor court, according to the Pittsburgh detectives, is none other than A. Edward Cortell, one of the country's most noted forgers, who escaped from the prison farm at Radford, Fla., on May 4.

His arrest followed the story told by two well-to-do Harrisburg (Pa.) girls with whom he had motored to this city with promises of wealth.

A week following his escape from the Florida prison camp, Cortell said he arrived in New York. After passing a dozen worthless checks, he slipped out of town, he said. Since that time he told the detectives, he has been wandering about the country in a high powered automobile purchased with money received from worthless checks.

### 1 Killed at Grade Crossing.

Los Angeles, July 16.—One unidentified girl was killed and two others, Mr. and Mrs. William F. Morgan, were injured, perhaps fatally, when an electric train struck Morgan's automobile at a grade crossing here. Witnesses said no warning whistle was blown as the train approached the crossing.

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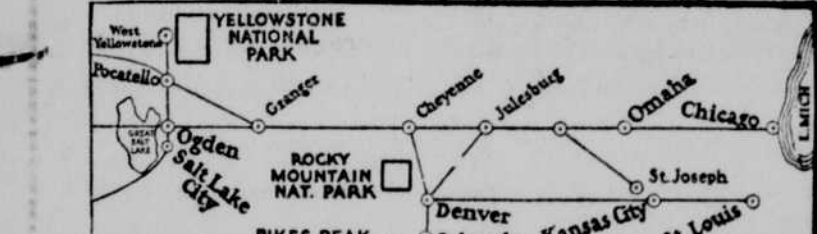

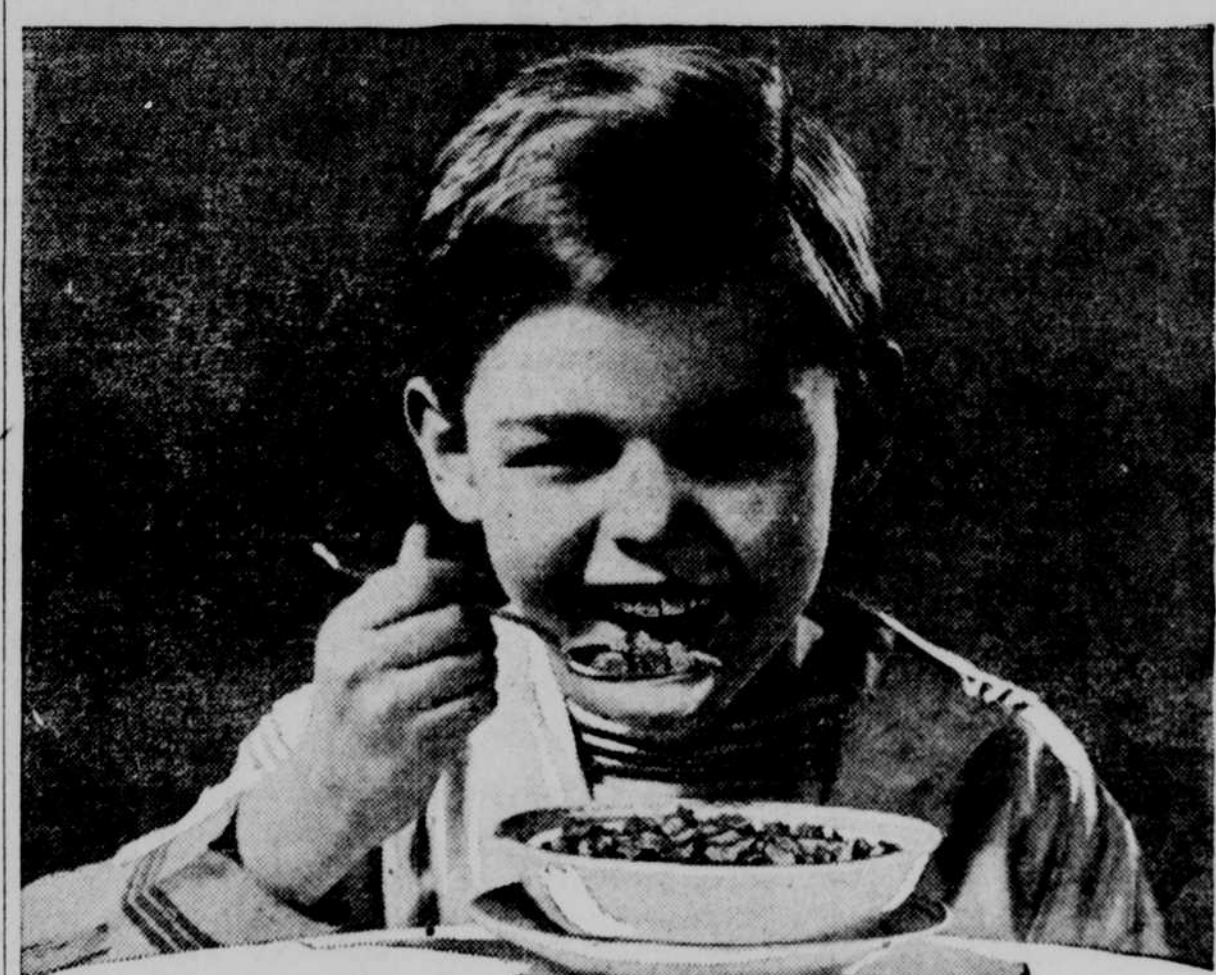
