

Eagles Stage Huge Parade in Mile High City

Caravan Nearly Mile Long Winds Way Through Streets of Denver—Announce Officers Saturday.

Denver, Aug. 10.—Members of the Fraternal Order of Eagles, nearly 3,000 strong, who have been Denver's guests in their annual convention and silver jubilee for the last two days, burst forth in a dazzling and picturesque parade today through the business district that was the first public demonstration of the organization since it convened here.

The parade was almost a mile in length and included every Eagle in the city. A score of bands provided music for the marchers, who were headed by William C. Doherty of New Haven, Conn. Floats depicting ritual work of the order formed one of the features of the caravan, which included scores of automobiles, some gayly decorated and dozens of drill teams.

Delegates to the convention attended a picnic at a local amusement park this afternoon, and consumed several truck loads of watermelons, which were carried in the parade in snow hauled to the city from the nearby mountains.

Announcement of the election of officers of the order for next year will be made at Saturday's session. Friday morning committee reports will be made on the reports of grand officers for the last year and prizes will be awarded the winners of contests in today's parade. At noon order will join with the city in memorial services for the late President Harding.

Seven drill teams will participate for the \$5,000 in prizes for exemplification of the ritual work of the order, which began early Wednesday morning and continued throughout the day, it was announced tonight.

Delegations successful in the competition represented cities of Indianapolis, Jameson, N. Y.; Worcester, Mass.; Buffalo, Cincinnati, Leavenworth, Kan., and Dayton, O. Other drill teams which competed were from Akron, O.; Milwaukee, Anderson, Ind., and Canton, O.

Army Records May Identify Skeleton

Fremont, Neb., Aug. 10.—Efforts to identify the skeleton found along the Platte river last Sunday by Will Taylor as Carl Scoresome, missing Fremont man, have failed to bring any conclusive evidence. Officials will check up Scoresome's physical appearance with the War department in the hope that the government charts will solve the mystery. Scoresome served during the world war with honors.

Last February, Frank Stribling, farmer, reported he saw a man leap from the rail of the Platte river bridge. About the same time, Scoresome had disappeared and the officers are seeking to connect the two incidents. Lucas Scoresome, Sioux City, brother of the missing man, and wife of Scribner, viewed the bones but were unable to discern a positive resemblance. The teeth in the skull are the only clues that may be developed and the government records may help along this line.

Johnson Asks Senators to Wear Mourning Ribbon

Johnson has sent to each member of the body a small piece of ribbon in the national colors draped in black, with a note saying, "It is my request that each senator of the state in the spirit of patriotic reverence wear on the lapel of his coat a little emblem of the nation's colors, tied with a bow of black ribbon, one of which I enclose herewith." The lieutenant governor adds that he sends the emblem in keeping with the proclamation of mourning for the late President Harding, issued by President Coolidge.

Seedling Mile of Highway at Kearney to Be Improved

Kearney, Neb., Aug. 10.—The city of Kearney annual levy includes a sum sufficiently large to make possible widening of the Watson boulevard three feet, by the construction of a concrete curb and gutter and the resurfacing of this mile of paved highway with two inches of asphalt. The boulevard was paved with concrete 10 years ago, being the first of the so-called seedling miles of the Lincoln highway to be laid down in Nebraska. The improvement cost will be approximately \$18,000.

Swede Home Lutherans Celebrate Founding of Organization in 1873.

The Swede Home church was organized August 12, 1873, with a membership of 15. Of that number there are but five living. Two of the original members died of burns received in a prairie fire in Polk county in 1878. The surviving original members are: N. P. Hult of Colton, Ore.; Mrs. August Hult of Swede Home, Charles Thelander of this city, Mr. and Mrs. Emanuel Lindblade of Stromsburg, Neb.

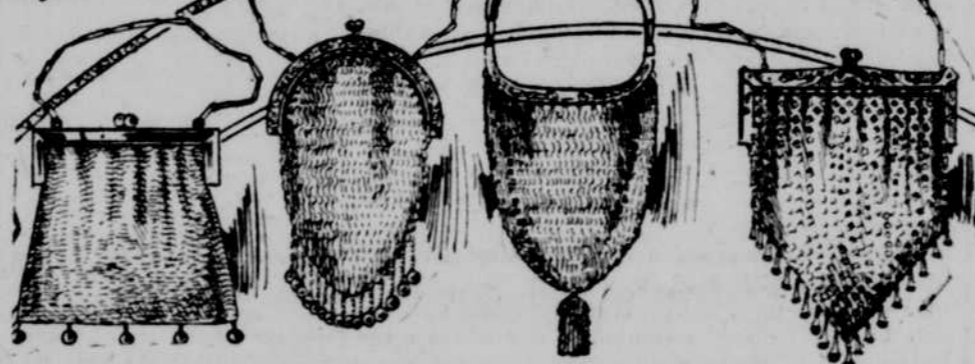
