

Buffaloes Developing the Habit and Defeat Denver for Seventh Straight Victory

Omaha Takes an Early Lead After Hitting Two Denver Hurlers Freely and Wins Contest by 14 to 4 Score

Those Omaha Buffaloes chased Billy Gilbert and his Denver Bears tagged again yesterday afternoon, scoring a 14-4 victory over the Grizzlies in the second game of the series. And it was the seventh consecutive victory for the herd, too.

Ed Konechey's hurlings knocked two Denver hurlers for a row of fag poles in the first three innings; then settled down and didn't score any more tallies until the eighth, when they chalked up their 14th marker as sort of a grand finale.

In the first inning the herd scored three runs and in each of the second and third, five Buffaloes scampered across the rubber. In the first three innings Omaha registered 13 runs on 11 hits, two of them being doubles and one a triple. Two bases on balls, a pair of sacrifices, a grand slam and a flock of Bear bobbles all helped the Buffaloes score their first number of runs in the first trio of innings.

Buffaloes Hit Well Early.
Vorches started for the visitors, but was jerked in the second after the herd had scored four runs on six hits. Gross relieved him and was knocked from one corner of the lot to the other for a little more than two innings, during which time he allowed the Buffaloes nine runs and five hits, after the third inning. Gross settled down and hurled a nice game for the remainder of the afternoon.

Cream of England's Turf Will Race America's Best

THE great international \$100,000 thoroughbred race is on.

Papyrus, winner of England's famous classic, the Epsom Downs derby, will meet an American 3-year-old which will be picked through the medium of a test race, on October 20 at Belmont park, New York.

The final arrangements for the event, certain to be of world-wide interest, were concluded today by a cablegram from Maj. August Belmont, chairman of the Jockey club of New York.

The race will be under the auspices of the Jockey club which planned the race and will be backed by the Westchester Racing association, operator of Belmont park.

It will be over the mile and a half route. The winner will receive \$30,000 and the loser \$20,000.

The test race, called the National Trial sweepstakes, will be part of a program on September 15 at Belmont Park, for which the feature and Jockey club gold cup are already scheduled. This race calls for a subscription of \$1,000 for each candidate.

The Westchester Racing association will add \$2,500.

The thoroughbreds to represent America against Papyrus will be picked by the Jockey club of the three placed horses in the test.

The most likely candidates for the honor are Harry F. Sinclair's Zevy Richard T. Wilson's Wilderness, Admiral Cary T. Grayson's My Com Harry Payne Whitney's Flagstaff, J. S. McDonough's Martingale, and Dunlin and Montford Jones' the Clown. The owners of these stars have announced their willingness to participate in the trial.

Ben Jones, the Parnell, Mo., horseman, will bring his Upride Jones stable to Omaha today. Already four from this stable have arrived from Parnell.

L. Brown arrived from Davenport, Ia., yesterday with Title and Peter Brown, the latter a likely looking entry. George Crippen of Waco, Tex., came with eight head which have been running at Davenport and other middle western tracks. His shipment includes Thomas Ward, March, L.
