

Community Hall and Park Urged for Tecumseh

Special Election Will Be Held to Permit Sale of Gift Park to Civic Clubs Will Donate Funds.

Special Dispatch to The Omaha Bee. Tecumseh, Neb., Aug. 22.—A general committee from every civic and military society in the city is at work to secure a site for a community building and parkway through the block of ground south of the court-house to the Burlington station. The committee has secured option on the needed ground, two men offering to donate lots if the city will assume the paving tax. The entire cost of the ground is \$2,000.

Tecumseh Woman's club offers to donate \$1,000 and the Kiwanis club has pledged \$200. Sixteen years ago Mrs. Sarah Brandon willed the city a tract of ground for park purposes, but nothing has been done to convert the grounds into a park. The committee has asked the city council to sell the grounds and use the money for the purchase of the parkway. A special election has been called for September 11 to vote on the sale of the Brandon park.

The grounds proposed for the parkway and building site will give the city five lots and a parkway 40 feet wide through the center of the proposed community building would be 66 by 150 feet. It is not planned to go ahead with the community at this time.
