Search for the Indian is now under way.

Fernandez will be brought to Colorado Springs from Denver tomorrow morning by special operatives of the district attorney's office in an effort to establish whether he was the man whom Mrs. R. H. Suttle, sr., mother-in-law of the slain girl, says came to her door early in the morning of the murder and asked to see Elsie.

Fernandez also will be confronted with "Mickey," the household pet of the Suttle family, half coyote and half Scotch collie, who is said to have had a dislike for the man who had been loitering in the neighborhood of the Suttle home the day and night before the crime.

British Cabinet Changes May Be Announced Soon

London, Aug. 26.—Changes in the British cabinet may be announced in a few days, according to the Daily News, which says the statement is made on "good authority."

As a consequence of the withdrawal by Reginald McKenna of his acceptance of the chancellorship of the exchequer, Neville Chamberlain is expected to succeed to that post, and Sir William Johnson Hicks, now financial secretary to the treasury, will probably succeed Chamberlain as minister of health.

Sunday Crowd Looks on as Man Is Knifed

Hundreds Chase Murderer Following Slaying of Victim on Doorstep of His Own Home.

New York, Aug. 27.—While scores of men and women on their way to church looked on and rendered no aid, Frank Katz, 23 years old, was stabbed to death on the stoop of his home Sunday.

Although more than 100 persons chased the murderer through the neighborhood from which he escaped by running down the stairs and into a cellar which was surrounded by the police.

Katz was stabbed a dozen times before he was slashed across the throat, according to the witnesses, who said the dead man had fought valiantly before he dropped to the pavement. Dr. Burner was summoned and before dying Katz, who was a painter, gave him the name of the man who stabbed him.

He said the man was jealous without reason. The police found the knife with which the stabbing was done.

Workmen Begin Junking Ships

Seven Vessels of the Line Being Torn to Pieces in Pacific Coast Yards.

San Francisco, Aug. 27.—The destruction of what many nations in the world might consider a fair sized navy has begun in two Pacific coast ship yards in compliance with orders predating the armament conference in Washington.

Seven "ships of the line," six of them out of service, and the seventh, the greatest of all, still less than half completed on the launching ways, are being fairly overrun today by "stripping crews" removing small ordnance and other works that "may come in handy" later. When the stripping is completed the hulls will either be disposed of to private owners for destruction or will be cut up and junked by the government.

Foremost comes the great Montana, 27.8 per cent completed at Mare Island, but it is foremost in size only. In point of historical and tragic interest the Georgia, also at Mare Island, claims the greatest attention. Back in 1906 while this battleship

was engaged in target practice off Provincetown, Mass., an explosion in one of its superimposed turrets killed the entire crew of 20 and nearly wrecked the ship.

The explosion was caused by a blast of wind forcing back the hot gases in the bore of the big guns after a salvo. As the breeches were swung open after the discharge the gases were forced through the guns and into the ammunition and shell piles nearby, overheating and detonating them.

Iowa Pastor-Sheriff Is Now Evangelist

Des Moines, Ia., Aug. 27.—Winifred E. Robb, Poul county's preacher-sheriff, who left the ministry when he was criticized for hanging men sentenced to death for murder during his term as sheriff, announced today that he will become an evangelist. Mr. Robb was chaplain in the 16th infantry regiment of the Rainbow division during the war, and pastor of the Urbandale Federated church here after he returned. He was elected sheriff of Poul county in 1920, and served for two years.

The former preacher-sheriff is planning an evangelistic tour of Iowa and neighboring states for this fall, he said. Since his retirement as sheriff he has been lecturing and conducting a summer resort near here.
