

Half of Omaha Quota for Japan Relief Raised

Walter Jardine, in Charge, Confident \$15,000 Total Will Be Raised in Few Days.

Half of Omaha's quota of \$15,000 for the Japanese relief fund has been raised, according to reports at Red Cross headquarters last night.

The actual amount of donations received at Red Cross headquarters is \$3,396.21, which does not include the Omaha Chamber of Commerce total of \$1,465 reported last night, \$1,000 from the Omaha Clearing House, about \$1,000 from another collection source, and other prospective contributions.

W. S. Jardine, in charge of the local Red Cross chapter's work of raising Omaha's quota, stated that a man who wanted to be known as "A Friend," yesterday promised to send a check for \$400. Mr. Jardine stated that he believes Omaha's \$15,000 will be raised within the next few days.

Of 12 women who went out yesterday in Japanese garb, Marjorie Moreshouse led the group with collections of \$49.31. Others followed in this manner: Arline Roseberry, \$29.07; Elizabeth Paffenbath, \$27.81; Mildred Osman, \$23.49; Duseila Dorland, \$29.20 and Katherine Allen, \$23.12.

(Continued From First Page.) side world, and from far-eastern ports especially, the food problem in the afflicted zone is rapidly assuming alarming proportions.

Heroic relief efforts being made by the cities of Kobe and Osaka are utterly unable to meet the urgent requirements of the half-famished millions who are sprawled over 20,000 square miles of desolation.

Lack of adequate communication and transportation is seriously hampering rescue work. Vital railway trunk lines are yet in such a demoralized condition that no traffic worthy of the name can be handled. It will be days before trains will be running on anything like a schedule that will meet the demands of the great national emergency.

Ray of Cheer. A ray of cheer beat its path through the pall of sorrow that mantles Japan when word reached this city that relief supplies valued at approximately \$1,000,000 have already been purchased by United States naval officials in Shanghai for immediate shipment to the earthquake region.

The supplies are to leave Shanghai next Tuesday for Yokohama aboard the shipping board steamer President Grant.

Relief vessels bound for Japan are reported to have sailed from San Francisco and Manila with thousands of tons of urgently needed supplies. The liner President Taft left San Francisco yesterday with a large cargo of rice while the American transport Pecos departed from the Philippines last midnight.

Scores of other ships throughout the world are being loaded with relief provisions for the victims of the empire's disaster.

Geography Changed. So violent was the catastrophe that the entire geography of the east coast of Japan is said to have been changed. Giantic tidal waves and powerful convulsions of the sea bottom are reported to have played havoc with the seacoast running in both directions from the bay of Tokio, reports here claim, and the tidewater contour for hundreds of miles gives the impression of a new continent risen from the ocean.

Many islands off the Japanese mainland are reported to have disappeared, and scores of coast towns have been washed into eternity by destructive tidal wave disturbances and other similar backwash phenomena of the sea.

Ohshima island off the Izu peninsula, has sunk into the ocean, according to authoritative accounts reaching Kobe today. This island had an estimated population of 50,000 inhabitants.

Over 20,000 bodies have been recovered in Tokio alone up to this writing, according to an official statement issued by the Japanese department of the interior. The injured, the statement adds, will in all probability reach some hundreds of thousands. An official estimate of the number of houses destroyed in the capital city is given at 350,000.

Casualties among the foreign colony of Yokohama would reach at least 200, according to an estimate made today by Admiral A. E. Anderson, commander in chief of the Asiatic fleet now anchored in the bay of Tokio. Several days will necessarily elapse before an accurate compilation of the foreign dead can be made.

Iowa Woolen Mills Destroyed by Fire. Nashua, Ia., Sept. 8.—The Nashua woolen mills here were consumed today by fire of unknown origin which broke out at 10:45 this morning on the third floor of the mills.

The Charles City fire department was summoned to help fight the blaze, but the only thing the fire fighters could do was to prevent the fire from reaching neighboring structures.

The loss is estimated at close to \$600,000, not fully covered by insurance.
