

Farm Bureau Attacks Weeks

Washington, Sept. 10.—The American Farm Bureau Federation, through Gray Silver, its Washington representative, issued a signed statement attacking Secretary Weeks and the Alabama Power company and the war secretary in which it

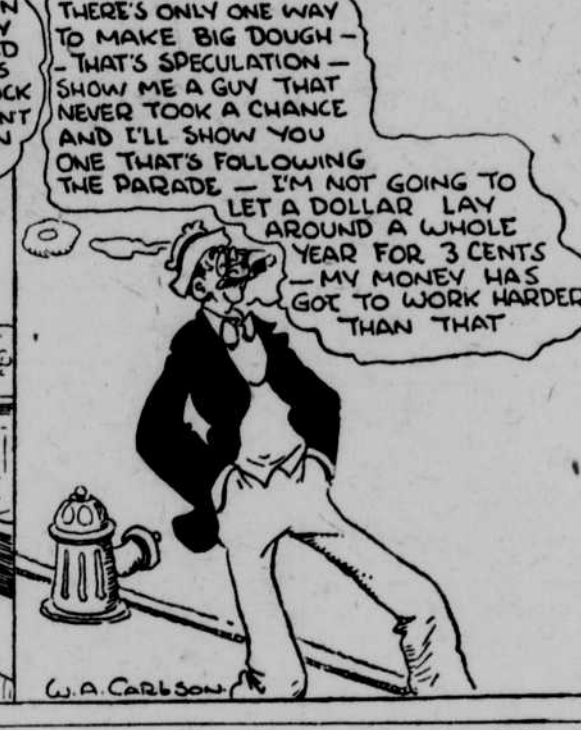

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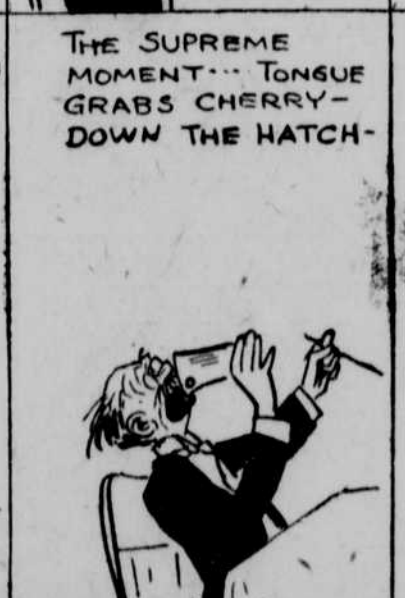
