

Boy's Father to Defend Him in Theft Case

Millard Says He's Going Back
to "Take His Medicine"
—Declares Cahow Only
"Helped."

"I'm guilty, I'm going back and take my medicine."
This was the statement Thursday morning of Q. Scott Millard, 19, former county treasurer of Cedar county Nebraska, who Wednesday afternoon confessed in the office of Sheriff P. A. Lainsou of Council Bluffs, to robbing the safe in the county treasurer's office last Monday night.

In a signed confession, made before he started back to Hartington, Neb., the county seat, in charge of Sheriff Peter Clarence yesterday, he confirmed the details of a confession made Wednesday, by Edward Cahow of Omaha, who held matches while young Millard worked the combination of the treasurer's safe.

He denied, however, that Cahow took anything from the safe.
Millard Poked the Money.
"I took the envelope with the money from the safe and put it in my pocket," the confession of Millard reads in part. "Cahow did not take anything, although he was there and knew I was stealing the money. He was to get a cut. I didn't want him to go in but he insisted on coming in with me."

Young Millard is the son of the county attorney of Cedar county. It is understood that his father is preparing his defense and that the prosecution will be placed in the hands of one of the deputy county attorneys. It will be an office divided against itself.

Sentiment in Hartington is said to favor young Millard. He bears an excellent reputation among the townspeople.

He declined this morning to give his motive for stealing the money from the safe.

A casual question by a detective, however, penetrated his armor.
"Where were you going when you got married?" was the question.
Millard flushed. "Who told you that?" he answered.

Mr. Weaver was born here in 1869 and was the oldest pioneer from the standpoint of length of residence in the county in attendance at the reunion. E. W. North was chosen vice president, and A. J. Galley was re-elected secretary. Fremont Man Is Hurt in Car Crash

Glaring Headlights on Approaching Auto Blamed for Wreck Near Oakland.

Fremont, Neb., Sept. 13.—Dell Stewart, 53, Fremont, was taken to the local hospital in a critical condition, suffering from injuries received when a truck in which he was riding plunged over a bank on the Cornhusker highway, south of Oakland.

Examination disclosed splintered ribs, a broken jaw and a broken nose, besides many painful cuts and bruises suffered when he was thrown forward through the windshield as the truck toppled over the embankment. Glaring headlights from an approaching car bewildered the driver, Arthur Campbell, Stewart's son-in-law, and when he swerved the machine to one side to avoid a collision, the truck rolled over the embankment. Campbell was thrown out of the truck and escaped injury.

Rome, Sept. 13.—In the campaign against alcoholism, Premier Mussolini has decided to amend the liquor law which allows one drink shop to every 500 inhabitants, so that there will be only one shop to every 1,000 inhabitants. The number of hours drink shops may remain open will be reduced.

Italy Rejects Mediator.

Geneva, Sept. 13.—Italy has notified Switzerland that it cannot accept the designation of the Swiss president as arbitrator of its dispute with Jugoslavia over Fiume, believing that such a step might unfavorably affect the pleasant relations between Italy and the Swiss confederation.

Italy's notification that it cannot accept arbitration, apparently brings in the issue with Jugoslavia. The time limit given by Italy to the Jugoslavs for a reply to its demands on Fiume expires within 48 hours, so that little time remains for further exchanges.
There is no definite information here as to Italy's next move beyond reports from Paris previously received, that Italy will proclaim the annexation of Fiume upon the expiration of the time limit, on September 15.
