

Poor Attendance At Third Day of Ak-Sar-Ben Meet

Cold Keeps Crowd Away From Track—Good Times Despite Slow Surface.

The poorest crowd of the fall meeting of the Ak-Sar-Ben races gathered yesterday afternoon at the Ak-Sar-Ben race track to watch the trotters and the thoroughbreds "do their stuff." Only a few hundred persons were in attendance during the harness events, and the crowd that assembled for the running races hardly numbered 2,000.

In spite of the slow track the drivers of the harness horses made good time in rounding the oval. Owing to the condition of the track, four of the entries were scratched. Bud Archdale and A. B. C. in the second race, and Edith Rankin and Bird in the third.

Henry Homas, driving Cupid Albin, started early to show his trim heels to all competitors and was highly successful before the three-quarter-mile pole was reached. The race was for second and third place in every heat, but the third Virginia Dare placed with little effort.

The track was judged by timekeepers as five seconds slow, but the time that was made was almost equal to that of any day when the track was fast. Time for the first heat, first race, was 54.2, 1.08, 1.40, 3.4, 1.39, 1.41, 2.14, 2.14, 3.41, 1.08, 1.40, 3.4, 2.14, 2.14, 3.4, 1.39, 1.39 and 2.13. Frederick K., driven by Marvin Childs, took three straight heats in the second 2:08 trot event. Gold King, driven by C. Childs, had the first heat of the second race won easily. Then he broke a short distance from the finish and galloped across the line. In spite of the fact that he was in the lead at the time the judges ruled that he should take third place, giving Frederick K. the first heat.

Gold King failed to come back after that and took a second and then a third place in the next two heats, following Frederick K. all the way around the track. Time: first heat, 35.14, 1.39, 1.41, 2.14, 2.14, 3.4, 1.39, 1.40, 1.40, 2.12, 3.4, 1.39, 1.39, 2.13, 2.13. All of the entries were trying harder in the last heat than in either of the others.

A thrill was given spectators in the second heat of the third race, a 2:20 trot, when May Volo, driven by Marvin Childs, came racing up from the rear to finish first. May set off to a bad start and barely won third position at the turn into the stretch. With a beautiful burst of speed she closed up on and passed the leaders to win comfortably. Emilie R. Scott, McNally driving, and Hallie Harvest, W. Breitenfeldt driving, fought neck and neck for second place. Hallie Harvest took it by a head.

Emilie R. Scott took the first heat with honors but after that show money was the best she could claim. Hallie Harvest showed in the first heat and placed in the other two. Time for the 2:20 trot was first heat, 35.14, 1.39, 1.41, 2.14, 2.14, 3.4, 1.39, 1.39, 2.13, 2.13.

Before the end of the final heat of the third race the bulk of the crowd had begun to gather. When the first string of runners went to the post most of the spectators had arrived.

Dapper Dan, E. Taplin up, prime favorite in the testing, romped home at the head of the field in the first running race, the fourth event of the day. Mayville, R. Dority up, flashed under the wire to place with Horinga, M. Frey up, a second later running to show. The heavy going told on Dapper Dan and he was a tired pony as he scampered down the stretch. It was only his early running that saved him the race.

Golden Red, bearing the colors of the J. W. Plunkett stable, with C. Gross up, nosed out Full Again, H. Zander up, to win the second running event. Full Again, a favorite, got away to a bad start. All the way down the back stretch he held a position in the center of the field with Corto, Yorkick and Golden Red fighting for the lead. As the horses rounded into the home stretch, Full Again began to come up and at the finish was pressing Golden Red severely for first place. Corto held on long enough to show.

The last race was between Gold Bryan, favorite, L. Armstrong up, J. B. McGinn stables, and Paula, G. Sutton up. Mrs. M. B. Sutton's stable, the two horses got away to a good start and led to field the entire way around. Gold Bryan allowed himself to be passed by Paula until the three-quarter pole was passed, then he took the lead and held it. Paula had tired herself out in the first leg and dropped back, relinquishing her place to Rusticator and finishing her race. They came in: Gold Bryan by a head, Rusticator, a length, Paula a length.
