

Hit by Baseball. Man to Lose Arm

Wymore Conductor, Struck on Thumb During Game, Will Have Amputation.

Wymore, Neb., Sept. 17.—Being struck on the end of his thumb by a pitched ball will cost N. J. Lively, 33, Burlington conductor out of Wymore for the last eight years, his right arm.

On July 4 he took part in a ball game at Blue Hill, with other members of the train crew and a pile-driving gang, and was watching for his team when the accident occurred. A week later it was found necessary to remove a joint in his thumb, the bone having been split by the impact of the ball. Two weeks later the entire thumb was removed. Infection set in recently and he has gone to Rochester, Minn., to have his arm amputated, which, according to physicians, is necessary to save his life.

Milwaukee Will Show Big Electric Engine

One of the new, high-powered, bipolar, gearless, electric passenger locomotives now in use on its western lines will be exhibited in Omaha by the Milwaukee railroad on September 25, 26 and 27.

This locomotive, the most powerful in the passenger service, is 76 feet long, weighs 452,800 pounds, has a total tractive effort of 48,500 pounds and a tractive effort available at starting of 123,500 pounds. The bipolar giant is driven by 12 motors, with a total power rating of 2,200 horsepower.

Attendants will be in charge of the locomotive while it is on display here to explain its features. When traveling down hill the motors are converted into generators and feed power back into the line.
