



Governor Favors Gravel for Roads

Tells Hastings Commerce Body That State Should Operate Own Supply Plant.

Hastings, Neb., Sepjt. 18 .- Goveror Bryan strongly advocated the use gravel in Nebraska road building. an address at the Hastings Chamr of Commerce luncheon Monday

The governor was the principal beaker among a number of guests were here to attend the state invention of the American Legion. The governor's observations on a trip of some 1,400 miles of graveled roads in Minnesota during the sum-mer had convinced him, he said, that gravel should be used in Nebraska. Governor Bryan said the state hould operate its own gravel supply He declared that gravel is now han dled by a monopoly in Nebraska and that prices have been excessive. A mere inquiry by the state looking to operation of a plant at Ashland had brought a reduction in price, he said, of nearly one-third.
