It was the first time he had ever seen the picturesque home where George Washington lived and died. The millionaire manufacturer displayed a keen interest in the buildings and the priceless relics they contain, spending several hours at this national shrine. Then the practical side of his nature asserted itself. "What precautions have you against fire?" he asked. He was shown a row of red fire buckets, filled with water, and informed that they were the only means of combating any blaze that might start. The nearest fire department is at Alexandria, miles away. Ford seemed deeply concerned at the thought of Mt. Vernon falling a prey to flame and expressed a wish that he might do something to guard against such an eventuality. Today, a complete chemical engine, the last word in fire fighting apparatus, arrived at Mt. Vernon. It was the gift of the Detroit manufacturer.

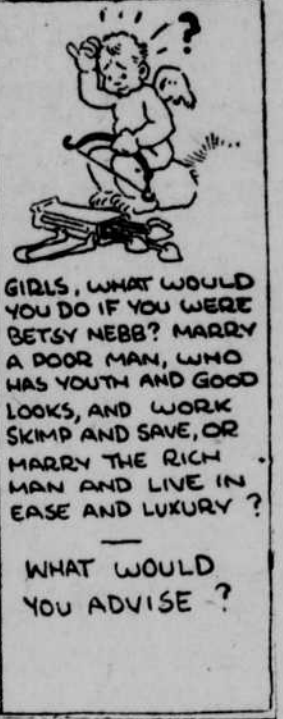

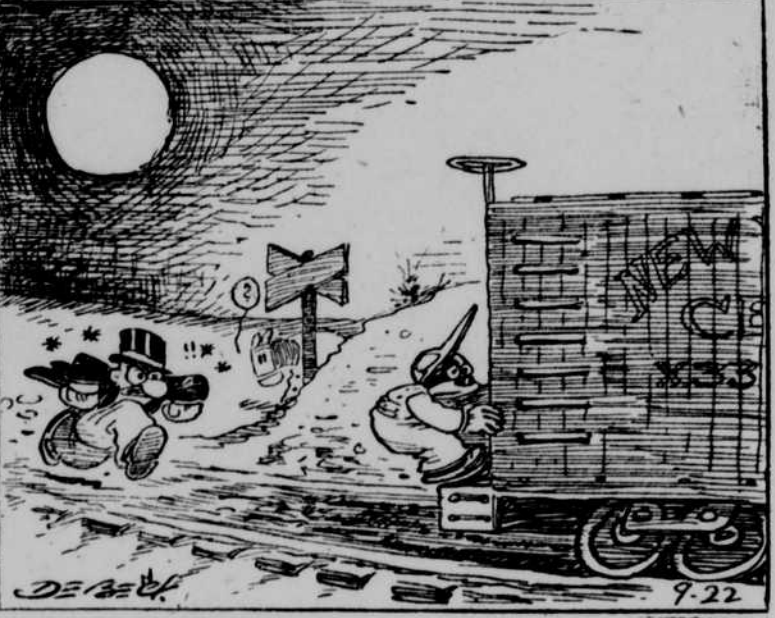
