

Carlos Enrique Home Ahead in Feature of Day

Black Monkey and Rungevo Provide Thrills with Their Fight to Place.

Favorites romped home winners in the 10th day's program of King Ak's race meeting yesterday over a heavy track at the enter street plant.

A card of seven speed events, ranging from a five furlong spring to a race of one mile and one-sixteenth graded the afternoon's program, and in every race the crowd, which was one of the largest of the meeting, was treated to an exciting finish.

The track was heavy from recent rains, but despite the condition of the oval, fairly good time was hung up after each race.

Of the seven races yesterday, the fifth, a five and furlong affair with such out-destroyers as Carlos Enrique, Black Monkey and O. Henry entered, might well be termed the feature spring of the day.

A field of nine thoroughbreds paraded past the grandstand for this event and among them was the winner Carlos Enrique, 3-year-old son of Seth May Day, and owned by the Denver stable, Jockey Johnny Singleton was in the pilot house.

Max Marston Eliminates Hope of Boston—Gardner Off His Game and Loses 8 and 7.

By Associated Press. Chicago, Sept. 21.—Jess Sweetser of New York got a step nearer the goal today in his defense of the amateur golf championship by defeating Bob Gardner of Chicago, twice holder of the title, 8 and 7, in the semi-finals.

The champion played one stroke better than perfect golf in the morning round and was even with par for the 11 holes played in the second round, while Gardner, slipping at times with various clubs, took 81 for the first round and was two over par when he lost at the 23rd hole.

Seldom was the champion poorer from the tee than Gardner and he was much more deadly with his irons and his putter. The former champion flubbed two drives, shanked two mashies and missed one three-foot putt, while he failed a number of times from five to eight feet. At one hole Sweetser pitched to within four inches of the cup and on the 17th, where Gardner laid him a stymie, the champion jumped it with a mashie niblick and holed out a par four.

Max Marston of Philadelphia was the Sweetser's opponent in the final round as the result of his victory, 3 and 2, over Francis Ouimet of Boston. While Marston did not shoot remarkable golf, taking 81 for the first round and being only a trifle better on the second, Ouimet could not get his game in working order and finally slipped on the last few holes, letting Marston get an advantage that he could not overcome.
