Renault is scheduled to right Jack Clifford in Montreal next Wednesday, and Fred Fulton in Boston next Fri day. He also has a match with Joe Downey within the next two weeks.

Flynn was bubbling over with joy yesterday morning. He was very much satisfied with the way in which Renault fought Herman. Leo P. is of the opinion that Renault will be ready for the champion in the near future.

Thursday night's knockout at the hands of Renault was the first setback Herman has suffered since coming to Omaha. He has been knocked off his feet,, but never knocked out, while under the managing wing of Jack Lewis.

The Herman-Renault bout Thursday night was the main event of the Douglas County Legion post's show, one of the best fight programs ever staged in Omaha.




