Mr. Belmont seemed much exercised by the matter, but whether his distress was occasioned by what he termed a "misleading report" or the price set up on the head of Papyrus, was not divulged. Ben Irish, owner of the English colt, is asking a mere matter of 55,000 pounds (\$265,000) for the horse. This, if true, disposes of all possible purchasers automatically. It is the highest price, by many thousands, ever asked for a thoroughbred race horse, makes Mr. Belmont's denial at once convincing and unnecessary.
